

SUGAR CRISIS PASSED, CLAIM.

With the abandonment of the government's efforts to control the distribution and sale of sugar, announced by Attorney General Palmer last Friday, the crisis in the nation's sugar shortage has passed, according to wholesale grocers in this city and Minneapolis.

Householders and other consumers of sugar are advised that there is nothing to be gained now by buying sugar supplies faster than they are needed, the wholesalers said. While there may be some rise in price, owing to the scarcity, an abundant supply of sugar from Cuban sources is assured and the price trend should be downward, they said.

After the United States Sugar Equalization board is dissolved December 31, the government will confine its efforts to the prosecution of profiteering in sugar, Mr. Palmer said.

BULLETINS ARE NOW FREE.

No charge, except for postage, will hereafter be made for the bulletins, "Cement and Its Use on the Farm," and "Mechanical Drawing for the Farm and Agricultural School," issued by E. C. Crane and George F. Krogh, respectively, of the division of agriculture of Minnesota. Heretofore a charge of 25 cents a copy was made for these bulletins, which may now be obtained on application at the Office of Publications, University Farm, St. Paul, when postage is included, two cents for the bulletin on cement, and three cents for the bulletin on mechanical drawing.
