Here is the introductory part of a press statement from the Friends of Ukraine:

"East Galicia given to Poland! What does this mean in the name of justice and humanity? How does it harmonize with the points—with the principle of self-determination trumpeted to the world? Where is the consistency and self-respect of the perpetrators of this cruelty?"

"The news comes like a thunderbolt from a clear sky on the 1,000,000 Ukrainians living in this country."

"It means nothing more nor less than the handing over of 4,000,000 people to the tender mercies of the race they hate the most and have the most reason for hating."

What about the other small peoples for whose independence and self-deter-

mination we went to Europe to fight? What about Ireland, the Tyrolese, the German Bohemians, the German Alsacians, the Germans in Schleswig and Holstein, the Germans in Silesia, the Egyptians, the southern Slavs in Fiume and Dalmatia, the Hindus and Koreans?

Articles of Incorporation of the Peoples Co-operative Association.

We, the undersigned, for the purpose of forming a co-operative corporation under and pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 382 H. F. No. 1065, General Statutes of Minnesota for 1919, and any amendments thereof, do hereby associate our lives as a body corporate, and do hereby adopt the following Certificate of Incorporation:

Article I.
The name of this corporation shall be the Peoples Co-operative Association. The general nature of its business shall be to engage in and conduct any agricultural, dairy, mercantile, mining, telephone, manufacturing, or mechanical business upon the co-operative plan known as the Rochdale system.

The principal place of transacting the business of this corporation shall be in the city of New Ulm, County of Brown, Minnesota.

Article II.
The time for the commencement of this corporation shall be October 15, 1919, and the period of its duration shall be thirty years. (1)

Article III.
The names and places of residence of the persons forming this corporation are Arnold Cordes of New Ulm, Minn.; Walter Keckeisen of New Ulm, Minn.; J. H. Haenze of New Ulm, Minn.; Irwin C. Alwin of New Ulm, Minn.; Geo. J. Hofmeister of New Ulm, Minn.; Henry Hogen of New Ulm, Minn.; Hubert Neisen of New Ulm, Minn.

Article V.
The management of this corporation shall be vested in a Board of Directors, composed of not less than seven and not more than ... members. The names and addresses of the first Board of directors are Arnold Cordes of New Ulm, Minn.; Geo. J. H. Haenze of New Ulm, Minn.; Hubert Neisen of New Ulm, Minn.; Walter Keckeisen of New Ulm, Minn.; Irwin C. Alwin of New Ulm, Minn.; Henry Hogen of New Ulm, Minn.

The first officers of this corporation shall be: President, Arnold Cordes; Vice-president, Walter Keckeisen; Sec., J. H. Haenze and Treasurer, J. H. Haenze. All of the above named officers and directors shall hold their respective offices aforesaid until the next annual meeting of the corporation to be held as provided in the by-laws, at which time and annually thereafter, a Board of Directors shall be elected from and by the stockholders of this corporation. The annual meeting of this corporation shall be held at its principal place of business as provided in the by-laws. Immediately after the election of directors, or as soon thereafter as practicable, the directors shall meet and elect from their number a president, a vice-president, a secretary and a treasurer. Any office except that of president and vice-president may be held by one person. The directors and officers of this corporation shall hold their respective offices until their successors have been duly elected and entered upon the discharge of their duties. The first meetings of the stockholders and of the Board of Directors shall be held as provided in the by-laws.

Article V.
The amount of the capital stock of this corporation shall be Twenty thousand (\$20,000) dollars, which shall be paid in in money or property, or both, in such manner, at such times, and in such amounts as the Board of Directors shall order. The capital stock shall be divided into Four Hundred (400) shares of the par value of \$50.00 each. (4)

Article VI.
The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which this corporation shall at any time be subject shall be the sum of paid up capital stock of the Association.
