C., recently. Re-instatement can be obtained only in case the premiums have not lapsed for more than 18 months. War risk insurance is now convertible into any one of the following six policies: Ordinary life, 20-year endowment, 30-year endowment, endowment maturing at age of 62, 20-payment life and 30-payment life.
