A NEW CHANCE FOR DISABLED HUMANS

DIVISION OF RE-EDUCATION AND
PLACEMENT OF INJURED
MEN AND WOMEN.

INTERESTING SKETCH OF WORK
DONE BY THE NEW STATE
DEPARTMENT.

In a letter, addressed to one of the
Review editors, Oscar M. Sullivan,
director of re-education of the Minne-
sota Department of Education, calls
attention to a new law, passed by the
last legislature and known as Chapter
365, Laws of 1919, which should prove
very interesting to every working man
and woman in the state, as it provides
re-education and placement to injured
persons. For this reason, we quote
from Mr. Sullivan's letter and also give
in full the contents of a little pamphlet,
issued by his division, for the benefit
of our readers.

Plan of the Work.
The plan of the work is to offer re-
education and placement to all persons
who have been disabled either by injury

or disease, from following their former
occupation," writes Mr. Sullivan. "The
only qualification is that they must
have been residents of the State of Minne-
sota at the time the disability was in-
curred. We treat each case separately,
find the most suitable training and ar-
range a contract for a course, paying
for the same out of the division's approp-
riation.

"If, at any time, you learn of persons
who have suffered impairment which
prevents them from returning to their
former occupation, we should be very
glad if you would advise us of their
names and addresses. We will then get
in touch with them and do our utmost
to bring about rehabilitation."

Should there be any unfortunate people
in New Ulm and vicinity, who are
not able to follow their accustomed oc-
cupation, due to an injury or disease,
the Review will be glad to assist them in
getting in touch with the Division of
Re-education of the Minnesota De-
partment of Education, or they or their
relatives or friends can take the matter
up with Mr. Sullivan. We quote as
follows from the pamphlet referred to
above:

Object of the Work.
This is a work which the State un-
dertakes for civilians in order to do
them substantially what the United
States Government has been doing for
injured soldiers and sailors. Every per-
son prevented by physical handicap
from earning a livelihood is a financial
loss to the state, and it was felt, there-
fore, that the public interest required
that such persons be interested as prom-
ptly as possible in occupations which were
within their possibilities, and that after
being trained, employment be found for
them. To this end the division of re-
education and placement of injured per-
sons has been established as a branch
of the state department of education and
in close co-operation with the state
department of labor and industries.
The scope of the law is broad. Its
benefits are not confined to persons in-
jured in compensation industries, or
even those injured in industry in general.
It includes those who have suffered in
street or home accidents as well as those
who have suffered in farm accidents or
railroad accidents. In fact, to be
eligible for re-training, it is not even
necessary that the disability shall be the
result of an accident. The law covers
also those who have suffered loss or less
of use of a member as a result of disease.
The sole restriction is that the applicant

must be of wage-earning age, and that
at the time the disability was incurred
he must have been a resident or citizen
of the State of Minnesota.
The division is prepared to investi-
gate every case and to arrange for
whatever course of instruction appears
to be most suitable. In most instances
it will be necessary to do this through
individual contracts. The division is
empowered, however, to grant aid to
any local boards of education that
undertake work for handicapped wage-
earners, and it is possible that at times
groups of injured persons will be cared
for in this manner. Co-operation is
requested of all persons or agencies who
come in contact with the disabled,
such as employers, insurance compa-
nies, hospitals, labor unions, social
service organizations, etc., as it is de-
sirable that the division begin its work
at as early a stage in the case as possible.
So far as any choice is possible on the
part of the division, preference will be
given during the present biennium to
those who have suffered major disabili-
ties, such as loss or loss of use of both
eyes, an arm, hand, foot or leg. This
is not intended to mean, however, that
consideration will not be given to other
types of permanent injury, and the
benefits of the law extended in particular
cases of merit.
On the question of residence the
attorney-general has given the following
advice:
"To be a resident of the state under
this act, one must simply have a fixed
abode within the state of a character
indicating permanency, at least for an
indefinite period of time. Residence
signifies a person's permanent home to
which, when he is absent, he has the
intention of returning. The residence of
a married woman and minor children is
the residence of the husband and father.
If the husband and father is dead, the
residence of the minor children is the
residence of the mother."

Text of Re-education Act.
(Chapter 365, Laws of 1919.)
An act empowering the state board for
vocational education to establish a divi-
sion for the re-education and placement
of persons disabled in industry or other-
wise, permitting co-operation with the
federal government, and making an
appropriation.
Be it enacted by the Legislature of
the State of Minnesota:
Section 1. There is hereby estab-
lished under the direction and control
of the state board for vocational educa-
tion, a division for the training and
instruction of persons whose capacity to
earn a living has in any way been destroyed
or impaired through industrial accident
or otherwise; provided that at the time
when the accident or disability was
incurred they were residents or citizens
of the State of Minnesota. The said
board shall in its regular reports to the
legislature describe in detail the work
of the division and may from time to
time issue bulletins containing infor-
mation relative thereto.
Sec. 2. The employes of the said
division shall be appointed and their
salaries determined by the said board.
The division shall be furnished with
suitable quarters in the State Capitol,
and the board may expend for salaries
and other necessary expenses of such
division such amounts as shall be ap-
propriated by the legislature.
Sec. 3. The state board for vocational
education and the department of labor
and industries or any agency which may
succeed it in the administration or su-
pervision of the Workmen's Compensa-
tion Act, shall formulate a plan of co-
operation with reference to the work of
said division. Such plan shall be effec-
tive only when approved by the governor
of the state.
Sec. 4. The said division shall aid
persons who are incapacitated as de-
scribed in section one in obtaining such
education, training and employment as
will tend to restore their capacity to
earn a livelihood. The division may
co-operate with the United States govern-
ment, and as a part of such co-operation
may extend the benefits of this act to
any civil employe of the United States
disabled while in the performance of
his duty, without regard to the residence
or citizenship of such employe, if in
the judgment of the board the benefits
offered by the Federal government are
sufficient to compensate for the cost.
The division may of its own accord,
establish or maintain, or in co-operation
with local boards of education, assist in
establishing or maintaining, such courses
as it may deem expedient, and otherwise
may act in such manner as it may deem
necessary to accomplish the purpose
of this act.
Sec. 5. This act shall take effect and
be in force from and after its passage.

Employment.
The division not only has the function
of re-education, but of finding employ-
ment for those suffering from physical
impairment. To accomplish this a place-
ment officer has been engaged and in
order that he may be in touch with the
general employment situation he has
been located with the St. Paul
office of the free employment bureau
of the state department of labor and
industries.
The primary purpose in including
placement work in the activities of this
division was, of course, to find positions
for those who had been re-educated.
When once the work is organized as a
specialty, however, it was felt that

the best results would be obtained by
getting the facilities of the agency at the
disposal of all handicapped persons
and its efforts will, therefore, not be
limited to those who have been re-
educated. In many instances it will
be desirable for the placement officer
to find temporary work for the applic-
ant while the course of training is in
progress.
One difficulty of former days in con-
nection with employment of injured
persons should no longer be encountered.
It has been an uncommon experience
in the past for employers to refuse
to hire anyone who was physically
impaired on the ground that their com-
pensation insurance rates would be
raised. Not very many companies were
guilty of this practice, but to put an end
to it, the 1919 legislature passed an act
making such discrimination a misde-
meanor. There is, therefore, no longer
any ground for apprehension on the
part of insured employes.
With the uninsured it must be made
simply a matter of honor to bear their
share of the supposed greater hazard.
We say "supposed" because there are
no statistics as yet to prove that there
is a greater hazard. Some recent studies
go to show that the theory of an in-
creased risk may be mistaken.
Anti-Discrimination Act.
(Chapter 367, Laws of 1919)
An act making it unlawful to dis-
criminate against handicapped persons

through workmen's compensation in-
surance rates and providing a penalty.
Section 1. No person, partnership,
association or corporation, or their
agents or employes writing workmen's
compensation insurance in this state
shall make or charge any rate which
discriminates against the employment
by the insured of any person who is
physically handicapped by reason of
loss or loss of use of any member due
to accident or other cause.
Sec. 2. Any person, partnership,
association or corporation, or their
agents or employes, offering a rate of
compensation insurance forbidden by
section 1 of this act shall be guilty of a
misdemeanor.
Sec. 3. Whenever any company or
its agents or employes shall have been
convicted of a violation of this act,
such fact shall be sufficient cause for
the cancellation of its license by the com-
missioner of insurance.
Sec. 4. This act shall take effect and
be in force from and after its passage.
Approved April 23, 1919.
