OBITUARY

MRS. AUGUST STEINKE.
Death came as a relief to Mrs. August Steinke, nee Minnie Lemke, who passed away at her home on North Payne street, Saturday morning at 4 o'clock, after an illness of three years as the result of creeping paralysis. She had been bed-fast since last October and in spite of the best of medical attention and loving care her condition grew gradually worse until she died.

Deceased was a native of Pommerania, Germany, where she was born June 28, 1870, and was therefore, nearly 50 years of age at the time of her demise. She came to America with her mother and brothers and sisters in 1884, locating in New Ulm. In 1890 she was married to Carl Otto of the town of Eden, who preceded her in death Oct. 13, 1913. From the time of her marriage until the death of her first husband, deceased resided on the latter's farm in that township. On April 10, 1917, she was joined in marriage in this city to her surviving husband, August Steinke. Of the nine children born to her first union, Mrs. Steinke leaves the following four children to mourn her demise: Mrs. Wm. Feig, Lambertson; Mrs. Ed. Hoffmann, New Ulm; and Minnie and Hilda Ott, at home. She is also survived by four grandchildren, two brothers and two sisters.

After brief obsequies at the late home at 1:30 o'clock this (Wednesday) afternoon, funeral services will be conducted at the Lutheran church at 2 o'clock, Rev. C. J. Albrecht officiating. The remains will be laid to rest in the Lutheran cemetery here.

MRS. MAGDALENA KEIM.
Mrs. Magdalena Keim, widow of Joseph Keim who died in 1911, died at her home in Sleepy Eye last Sunday at the age of 90 years. The deceased was born at Neuhauersel, Bohemia, former Austria, and emigrated to the United States when she was still young. She came direct to Brown county where she lived at Milford for a while. Later on they moved to Albin where her son John now owns and operates the old homestead. For about a year, the deceased lived with her son-in-law John Sperl of New Ulm, but the last 3 years she lived at Sleepy Eye. Mrs. Keim is survived by the following five children: Frank and Joseph, Mahanran county; John, Albin township; Mrs. John Sperl, New Ulm; and Wenzel, St. James. 
