**AGED WOMAN PROFESSOR DIES AT WASHINGTON, D. C.**

Maria Sanford, Well-Known Educator, Found Dead in Bed at Age of 83.

Maria Sanford, professor emerita of the university of Minnesota, died at the home of Senator Knute Nelson in Washington, D. C., early last Wednesday morning. She was eighty-three years old.

Dr. Sanford opened the twenty-ninth continental congress of the Daughters of the American Revolution in Washington Monday. She was in her usual good health until late at night, her friends said. She was found dead at seven a. m., in Senator Nelson's home, where she had been a guest since her arrival in the capitol.

Maria Sanford was born at Saybrook, Conn., and was the only woman professor in the university when named professor of history at Swarthmore college in 1871.

In 1880 Miss Sanford was named assistant professor of history at the university of Minnesota. Later she became head of the department of rhetoric and public speaking and held this position for twenty-nine years until her retirement. Her home was in Minneapolis.

**SOVIET RUSSIA AND THE FREEDOM OF INDIA.**

London.—The following account is published in the Morning Post: "Only the other day a train carrying 120 propagandists and millions of pamphlets in Urdu set out from Moscow for Afghanistan. The principal volume in this library consists of a book called "India for the Indians," in two editions, one in Urdu, the other in Russian. It consists largely of documents intended to prove that India is exploited and impoverished by the British and will be liberated by the Bolsheviks.

"For us Russians (says the preface), exposed as we are to the danger of becoming a colony of Western Europe, and perhaps even of American-Japanese imperialism, it is a matter of urgency to find an ally against the common enemy in the people of India, like us persecuted and with whom we have many points in common. But the Indian Revolution will have a world-repercussion, for it is impossible to have a general peace without an independent India. India will be the first citadel of the Revolution of the West. We Russian Revolutionists must not only promote revolution in India but directly and indirectly sustain it with all our power."

**PASSING OF A PIONEER.**

Mrs. Robert Hinton passed away recently at her home in Morton, aged 81. Mrs. Hinton and her husband, who preceded her in death several years ago, were among the pioneer residents of the Iberia community, living on a farm along the banks of the Cottonwood river for a number of years. After the Sioux Indian Reservation was opened up for settlement, the family located in the town of Home, where they resided quite a number of years. Later Mr. Hinton was appointed Indian agent at Morton, which position he held up to the time of his death. During the week of the Indian massacre here in 1862 Mrs. Hinton gave birth to a son at the Dakota House here. Her husband was one of the valiant defenders of New Ulm during the attack by the Redskins.
