ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF BUENGER FURNITURE COMPANY. We, the undersigned, for the purpose of forming a corporation under the Laws of the State of Minnesota, do hereby subscribe and acknowledge the following articles of incorporation.

Article I. The name of this corporation shall be "Buenger Furniture Company". Article II. The general nature of the business of this corporation shall be to buy, manufacture, sell, either at retail or wholesale, and generally to engage and deal in carpets, rugs, house furnishings and fittings, furniture of all sorts, ornaments, bric-a-brac, fancy goods, leather goods, draperies, all articles and commodities relating to or used in the furnishing of private homes, houses, offices, clubs or other places, and everything that pertains to or is incidental to a general furniture and house furnishing business.

Article III. The principal office and place of business of said corporation shall be at the City of New Ulm, Brown County, Minnesota, but branches, offices and agencies may be established at such other places in this state, or in other states, as the Board of Directors may select, and the corporation may carry on its business at any such place within or without this state.

Article IV. The time of commencement of this corporation shall be May 1st, A. D. 1920, and the period of its duration shall be thirty years.

PHONE RATE HEARING AT ST. PETER AND WINTHROP Former Will Be Held Tomorrow; Latter Today. Request of Increase in Rates is Made.

The State Railroad and Warehouse Commission has ordered two hearings, to be held at St. Peter and Winthrop, in the matter of the application of the Nicollet County Telephone Co. for authority to increase its rates for business, residence and rural telephone service in St. Peter, New Sweden, Nicollet, Lafayette, Kasota, Cleveland, Gibbon and Gaylord. The St. Peter hearing will be held in the court room of the court house tomorrow (Thursday) at 10:30 a. m., while the hearing at Winthrop was scheduled for this (Wednesday) morning, at the same hour, in the City of Winthrop. The hearing at St. Peter is for the St. Peter, Kasota, Cleveland, New Sweden and Nicollet exchanges, while the one at Winthrop is for the Lafayette, Gibbon and Gaylord exchanges.



For all the other exchanges of the company the following new rates are proposed: Individual line business, \$2.50; two-party line business, \$2.25; individual line residence, \$1.75; four-party line residence, \$1.50. The following proposed new rates are applicable to all exchanges: Rural multi-party, \$1.75; extension sets, business or residence, 50 cents net; extension bells, 15 cents net; desks sets for residence and rural stations, additional, 25 cents net; temporary disconnection, one-half the regular rate for any class of service. All of the above rates, except where stated otherwise, are gross. A discount of 25 cents per month will be allowed on all local gross rates if paid on or before the 20th of the month in which service is rendered, while rural rates are payable quarterly with a discount of 75 cents if paid on or before the 20th of the first month, or the quarter in which service is rendered, 50 cents if paid on or before the 20th of the second month of the quarter, and 25 cents if paid on or before the third month of the quarter. These increases are in line with a raise in telephone rates throughout the state. Those of the New Ulm Rural Telephone Co. were boosted by order of the State Railroad and Warehouse Commission last month.
