

### OBITUARY

#### THEODORE LANGE.

Theodore Lange, one of the pioneer residents of Nicollet county, passed away at a local hospital, Friday morning at 4:45 o'clock. The cause of his demise was intestinal cancer, with which he had been suffering since last November. Mr. Lange underwent an operation at a local hospital last December, in the hope of securing relief from his affliction, and apparently recovered. About four weeks ago, he was again taken seriously ill and in spite of the best medical attention and tender care, the inroads made by the disease were so great that he could not survive.

Deceased was 68 years old last Christmas day, having been born December 25, 1851, at Chicago, Ill. He came to Minnesota in 1862, locating on a farm in Courtland township, Nicollet county, shortly after the Indian massacre, and had lived there ever since, with the exception of one year—1909-1910—which he spent in New Ulm.

Mr. Lange was married at the Courtland Lutheran church, November 20, 1870, to Miss Sophie Gieseke, who survives him. Had he lived until next November, Mr. and Mrs. Lange could have observed their golden wedding anniversary, and the children had already planned on having a big surprise celebration for their parents. Aside from his sorrowing widow, deceased leaves four children—two sons and two daughters—to mourn his demise. Two children passed away during the diphtheria epidemic in this section in 1880 as a result of this disease. The surviving children are: Mrs. A. C. Bode, Good Thunder; Mrs. F. L. Bode, Fairmont; H. F. Lange, Sac City, Iowa, and A. H. Lange, Wall Lake, Iowa. He also leaves 14 grandchildren and one sister, Mrs. George Gieseke, Sr., of this city.

Funeral services were conducted at the Courtland Lutheran church, Monday morning at 10:30 o'clock, whereupon the remains were shipped to Fairmont, where interment was made in beautiful Lakeside cemetery, Mrs. Lange having decided to make her future home with the family of her daughter, Mrs. Bode, at that place.
