

OBITUARY

MRS. DAVID RONDAHL.

Mrs. David Rondahl, nee Lunita Palmer, passed away at the Fairview Hospital, Minneapolis, Sunday, following an operation for obstruction of the bowels and pelvic abscess, which had been performed upon her a short time previously. This was the third operation which she had undergone in the past two months, and during the last few weeks her condition was very critical.

Deceased was born in New Ulm, Nov. 20, 1859, and was, therefore, 30 years old at the time of her demise. She was married at Fairfax, Feb. 2, 1915, to her surviving husband, and after residing in that village for two years, removed to Minneapolis some three years ago, which city had since been her home.

Aside from her grief-stricken husband, she leaves her sorrowing parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. L. Palmer, of Fairfax, a sister and a brother, Miss Viola and Roman Palmer, both at home.

The remains were brought to New Ulm, Monday, and funeral services were conducted at the Lutheran church yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock, Rev. Im. F. Albrecht of Fairfax officiating. The remains were laid to rest in the Lutheran cemetery here.

Deceased was a granddaughter of Mr. Louie Vogel and a niece of Mrs. Wm. Blauert and Mrs. Wm. Stolljes of this city. Among those from out-of-town who attended the funeral were: Mr. and Mrs. L. L. Palmer and children, Miss Viola and Roman, Fairfax; Mrs. Nick J. Harris, Mankato; Rev. and Mrs. Schierenbeck, Renville; Mrs. Henry Harden and Mrs. Frank O'Neill, Minneapolis.

FRANK W. GRAU.

Death came as a relief from a long and lingering illness, when Frank W. Grau, well-known farmer of the town of Sigel, passed away at a local hospital, Friday morning at 3 o'clock. He had been ailing for the past two years and was confined to his bed for some eight months. For the past four weeks he had been receiving medical attention at the hospital here. His death was due to dropsy and complications.

Deceased was 45 years of age, having been born in the town of Sigel, May 28, 1875. He was married in this city, 22 years ago last April, to Miss Anna Weg, who survives him. Of the seven children born to Mr. and Mrs. Grau, two died in infancy. The five living children are: Edward, Clara, Arva, Irvin and Viola, all at home. He also leaves his father, George Grau, of this city; and the following five sisters to mourn his loss: Mrs. Gust. Fehlbauer, New Ulm; Miss Katherine Grau, who lives with her father here; Mrs. John Kopp, Cottonwood township; Mrs. George Grossmann, Linden township and Mrs. Frank Horn, Sigel township.

Funeral services were conducted at Holy Trinity Catholic church in this city, Monday morning at 9:30 o'clock, whereupon the remains were laid to rest in the Catholic cemetery here.

MRS. JULIUS LOOSE, SR.

Mrs. Julius Loose, Sr., nee Dorothy Runge, was called by the grim reaper at the Loose home at Morgan several weeks ago. The deceased formerly was a resident of this city. Mrs. Loose was born at Chicago, May 9, 1854, and came to Nicollet when she still was a child, relatives there taking care of her after the death of her parents. She was married to Julius Loose, Jan. 2, 1872, and their union was blessed with fourteen children, eleven of whom are still living. For a few years they lived in Nicollet and New Ulm, and then removed to a farm in Eden township. The past six years they lived at Morgan. The surviving children are: Herman, New Ulm; Emil, Morgan; Julius, Woodworth, N. D.; Gustave, Albert and William, Eden township; Otto, Morgan; Mrs. Ahn Ziegenhagen and Mrs. Rich Ziegenhagen, Morgan; and Alma and Elsie, at home. The funeral services were held Friday, July 2, at the Morgan Lutheran church, and interment was made in the Eden Lutheran cemetery. Prof. E. R. Bliernecht officiating.

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
