

**OBITUARY**

**MRS. JOSEPH HOLM.**  
Mrs. Joseph Holm, nee Frances Holm, residing on North Payne street in this city, passed away at the farm home of her son, Henry Holm, in the town of Sigel, Sunday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock. She had been ailing for the past four months, but was confined to her bed only four days, when death came as a relief from an incurable malady, cancer.  
Deceased was born in Austria, May 8, 1848, and, therefore, attained the

ripe age of 72 years. In 1870 she came to America, directly to New Ulm, and later located on a farm in the town of Sigel. About a half year after arriving here, she was married to her surviving husband at the Holy Trinity Catholic church. Twelve years ago Mr. and Mrs. Holm retired from active farm life and New Ulm has since been their home.  
Aside from her husband, Mrs. Holm leaves the following five children to mourn her demise: Joseph Holm, Paribault; Frank and Henry Holm, Mrs. Henry A. Kretsch and Mrs. Edward Flor, all residing in the town of Sigel. She is also survived by 20 grandchildren.

Funeral services will be conducted at Holy Trinity Catholic church here this (Wednesday) morning at 10 o'clock and the remains will be laid to rest in the Catholic cemetery here.

**SODA FOUNTAIN IN STATE OWES \$100,000 TAX CHARGE**

Due to the lax methods of accounting and carelessness on the part of people in charge of soda fountains rather than attempts to defraud the government, at least \$100,000 has been paid by the public in Minnesota to dealers for the war tax on ice cream and soft drinks and has not been turned in to the government, revenue officials recently estimated. A drive inaugurated by the forces of E. J. Lynch, internal revenue collector for Minnesota, to collect the entire amount paid resulted in the month of July in the payment of \$30,000 which the new checking-up process has revealed. There is still \$20,000 in dispute.






