TEACHERS FOR RURAL SCHOOLS

EVERY DISTRICT IN BROWN COUNTY, EXCEPTING TWO, IS SUPPLIED.

MANY RURAL SCHOOLS HAVE COMMENCED FALL TERM. 46 REMAIN.

Brown county's hard-working county superintendent of schools, R. B. Kennedy, is enjoying a brief respite from the arduous duties of his office during the past several weeks. He has been kept busy assisting the school boards of the various rural districts in the county to secure teachers, and every district, but two, is supplied with an instructor. There are, however, many minor details to demand Mr. Kennedy's attention from this time forward, as almost every week, up to and including November 1, number of rural schools in the county are beginning the fall term.

List Nearly Complete.
As indicated above, only two vacancies exist in the list of teachers for the rural schools in Brown county, while in some counties great difficulty is experienced in securing a sufficient number of instructors to go around. District No. 43 in Leavenworth and District No. 66 in Stately are the only rural schools in Brown county that have not as yet engaged a teacher. The fall term in the former district will begin Monday, October 4, and in the latter district the date fixed for the opening of school was Monday of this week.




