

OBITUARY.

MRS. DANIAL WERNER.

Robert Marquardt and his sister, Mrs. Edward G. Werner of this city, received the sad news last Wednesday, that their mother, Mrs. Daniel Werner, has suddenly passed away at her home in Lambertton that morning at 7 o'clock. Mrs. Werner had apparently been enjoying good health until the evening before her demise, when she complained of indisposition. A physician was called, but her condition was not believed to be alarming. Last Wednesday morning she called to her husband, who became alarmed at her appearance and immediately summoned medical assistance by telephone, but when he returned to her bedside, she had already passed away.

Deceased was born in Germany about 68 years ago and came to America when a young woman. For many years she made her home in Germanstown township, Redwood county, and was married to her surviving husband some 30 years ago. They have been residents of Lambertton for the past 10 or 12 years. Aside from her sorrowing husband deceased leaves the following children to mourn her demise: Mrs. William Wegner, Mrs. Frank Brandt and Mrs. John Krinke, Lambertton; Mrs. Edward G. Werner and Robert Marquardt, New Ulm; Mrs. Dennis Hayes and Miss Olga Werner, residing in Northern Minnesota.

The funeral services were conducted at the Evangelical Association church in Lambertton, Sunday afternoon, and the remains were laid to rest in that village. Those attending the obsequies from this city were Mr. and Mrs. Werner and children, Harland, Melvin and Lloyd, Mr. Marquardt and Wm. H. Gieseke.

JOHN KUEHN, SR.

Another pioneer settler of Brown county answered the final summons, when John Kuehn, Sr., for many years a resident of the town of Sigel, passed away peacefully at his home on South Broadway in this city, Friday noon. About two weeks ago he suffered a slight paralytic stroke, which, together with the infirmities usually attendant upon aged people, caused his demise. He had enjoyed fairly good health previously.

Deceased was a native of Ferbitz, province of Brandenburg, Germany, where he was born September 26, 1836, and consequently reached the ripe old

age of 84 years. He was married in the Fatherland August 20, 1868, to Miss Dorothe Schumacher, who survives him, and with his wife and his parents he came to America shortly thereafter. Mr. Kuehn purchased a tract of 160 acres of school land in Sigel, which for 48 years was the family home, until Mr. and Mrs. Kuehn retired from active farming some four years ago and removed to New Ulm, which has since been their place of residence.

Eleven children came to bless their union, four of whom preceded their father in death. The surviving children are: Mrs. Herman Fritsche, Cottonwood township; Henry Kuehn, Wanda; William Kuehn, Red Lake Falls, Minn.; Otto Kuehn, Wanda; Mrs. Arthur Besemer, Sigel township; Mrs. Herman Zimmermann, Wabasso, and John Kuehn, Jr., on the old homestead in Sigel township. Deceased also leaves 22 grandchildren to mourn his demise, as well as two sisters, Mrs. William Bartsch of Bird Island and Mrs. August Schwerdtfeger of Los Angeles, Calif., and one brother, William Kuehn, of Redfield, S. D.

Two years ago, Mr. and Mrs. Kuehn celebrated their golden wedding anniversary, which was made the occasion of a happy family reunion.

Funeral services were conducted at the Lutheran church in this city, Monday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock, following brief obsequies at the late home half an hour earlier. The remains were laid to rest in the Lutheran cemetery in Sigel township.

FULLER IS FOR FARMER-LABOR

CANDIDATE FOR CONGRESS IS GIVEN O. K. BY FARMERS' NATIONAL COUNCIL.

HAS PROVEN FRIENDSHIP FOR TOLLERS IN CITIES AND RURAL DISTRICTS.

The Farmers' National Council, a special union of the leading farm organizations of the country to assist in carrying into effect the farmers' program of national and international reconstruction adopted at the farmers' national conference on reconstruction in Washington, D. C., the forerunner of January, 1919, has prepared the following statement relative to H. A. Fuller of Mankato, independent candidate for Congress in this district, showing that Mr. Fuller has proven his friendship for the tollers in the cities as well as in the rural districts:

Organizer for Six Years. Mr. H. A. Fuller who is running for Congress on an independent ticket in the Second Minnesota District has for the past six years been an organizer for the American Society of Equity, and in constant touch with the difficult and varying problems of farmers.

During these six years he has organized hundreds of co-operative organizations—elevators, creameries, warehouses, stores, and one bank. These co-operative enterprises, based upon bona fide co-operation, have benefited the farmers by thousands of dollars, as have the live stock shipping associations, organized by Mr. Fuller, which have done away with the local stock buyers who live and wax fat off the producers.

So successful was the co-operative bank which Mr. Fuller organized in Iowa that the legislature of that state passed a law prohibiting the issuing of any more bank charters for the space of two years. This is very ample proof of the value of the bank which Mr. Fuller organized.

Knows Labor's Needs. While Mr. Fuller's activities have been centered largely in work for farmers, he has nevertheless equally sympathetic knowledge of the needs

and the rights of organized labor. In the state campaigns of Minnesota Mr. Fuller has frequently spoken at labor meetings with President Hall and Secretary Lawson of the Minnesota State Federation of Labor. Mr. Fuller belongs to the American Federation of Labor and carries a Union card.

Mr. Fuller has been an efficient worker in the get-together movement of the farmer-labor forces of the country and at the All-American Farmer-Labor Co-operative Congress held in Chicago in February of this year he worked on committees with Warren S. Stone, L. E. Sheppard, and John H. Walker representing labor. He was a member of the Committee on Banking and Credit of the Co-operative Congress and is now working for the consolidation of the farmers of the northwest.

Leader in Progressive Movement. As a member of the Farmers' National Council and one of the delegates of the American Society of Equity to the Farmers' National Reconstruction Conference held in Washington in January, 1919, Mr. Fuller has been a leader in the national progressive farm movement. As his activities as state organizer for Minnesota amply show, that Reconstruction Conference adopted the farmers' program for reconstruction which is generally regarded as the most forward-looking program in America and Mr. Fuller helped in drafting it. The program, if fully carried into effect, would save the farmers of America fully three billion a year and save the other workers of the country just as much. The Farmers and workers of the Second Minnesota District will be represented efficiently, continuously and courageously at Washington during the two next years in American history, if they elect Mr. Fuller to represent them. He can render a most conspicuous service at a time when such service is absolutely essential for the welfare of the American people.
