

INDICT SMALL AND HAESKA

FORMER YOUNG MAN CHARGED WITH LARCENY; LATER WITH ASSAULT.

NINE CITIZENSHIP PAPERS GRANTED; THREE DENIED. BUSY SESSION.

With 13, and possibly 14 cases that have been set for trial by jury to be disposed of during the December term of the Brown county district court, which was convened by Judge I. M. Olsen in this city, Monday morning, there is plenty of work in store for the petit jurors. Eleven civil actions on the calendar have been either continued, dismissed, settled or passed, leaving a balance of 26 which have been classified as court cases. A few remaining cases have not been definitely disposed of as yet.

Return Three Indictments.
The grand jury retired to its room shortly before noon, Monday, after receiving the customary instructions from the court, who appointed C. P. Cutting of Sleepy Eye as foreman. Otto Hummel of New Ulm was elected clerk. The grand jury completed its

labors at 11 o'clock yesterday morning, after having returned three indictments, two of which charge Herbert Haeska, a young man from North Star township, with assault in the third degree, while the other accuses Eugene Small of this city with larceny.

It will be remembered that Haeska was arrested early in November under suspicion of having shot at John Zimmermann, a young neighbor, upon two occasions. The affair was related in detail in the Review at that time. Small is charged with purchasing a number of war relics and other articles, belonging to August Marschner and which were stored with Mr. Marschner's household goods in rooms in the building owned by his father, B. Marschner, on South Minnesota street. The accused young man was arrested in Denver, Colo., recently and returned to New Ulm, Wednesday, in the custody of Deputy Sheriff Herman F. Jahnke, who went there to get him.

The grand jury failed to return an indictment against William M. Lavelle of Sleepy Eye, who was charged with burglary.

Paul Beilke of Eden township was excused from grand jury duty on account of illness.

Citizenship Papers.

Considerable time was taken up during the afternoon session of court, Monday, to dispose of 15 applications for citizenship papers, nine of which were granted, namely, to Christian Hohn, Andrew Saffert and Audi Mon-sour, all of New Ulm; Carl William

Jannsen (who at the same time requested the court to allow him to change his name to Nelson), Lake Crystal; Jorgen Peter Nielsen, Sleepy Eye; Andrew Diseth, Madelia; Hans Christian Johansen, Evan; Carl Alfred Throkelson; Comfrey, and Iver Forseth, Hanska.

Three applications were dismissed, due to the fact that the applicants had claimed exemption from draft during the war on account of being aliens. They are: Bernhard Christ-reich Piske, Springfield; Carsten Nielsen Anderson, Comfrey, and Thomas Joseph Ryan, Sleepy Eye. The applications of Olaf Solberg, Comfrey; Joseph Rubey, New Ulm, and John Harper, Springfield, were continued until the May term of court.

George Hogen is assisting Clerk of Court Carl P. Manderfeld as deputy while Charles Lindemann, Sr., acted as bailiff for the grand jury and Chas. Brust, Sr., and Joseph Weissenborn are performing like duties for the petit juries.




