The total receipts of Nicollet county during the past year aggregated \$495,423.27, including a balance of \$39,793.71 on January 1, 1920. The total disbursements amounted to \$485,999.74, leaving a balance on hand December 31, 1920, of \$9,423.53. The assessed valuation upon which the 1919 tax levy was based, was as follows: Real estate, \$10,309,910; personal property (less exemptions), \$1,988,795; money and credits, \$1,687,416; total, \$13,986,121. The amount of excess of assets over liabilities is \$236,460.71, the assets being \$487,110.11 and the liabilities aggregating \$250,649.40.
