The A. C. Ochs Brick & Tile Company of Springfield will furnish the face-brick for the new Mines Building at the State University, according to a contract for this material, which was awarded to this firm recently. Excavations for the massive new structure were commenced December 17, last year, and it is to be completed by September 1, 1922. A total of 225,000 face-brick are to be furnished according to contract, and it will require some 18 freight cars to transport this Brown county building material to the University Campus. The construction cost of the new Mines Building is estimated at \$300,000, while \$20,000 additional will be expended for laboratory apparatus and equipment. The building will be 60 feet wide and 280 feet long, divided into four sections.

Puhlmann Bros. of this city have been awarded the contract for the erection of a building, similar to the one occupied by the New Ulm Grocery Company, for the Spencer Grocery Company at Spencer, Iowa, of which R. M. Hicks, formerly connected with the New Ulm Grocery Company, is at present manager. The building at Spencer will be 45x130 feet, two stories and full basement, which is somewhat larger than the structure of the New Ulm Grocery Company, and will replace the three-story frame building, temporarily occupied by the Spencer Grocery Company, which was destroyed by fire last November. The new structure will be of fireproof construction with re-inforced concrete floors, and the general contract was let to the New Ulm firm at about \$25,000. Construction work will be started as soon as possible.
