The following report of a program in which Mrs. Zelle recently appeared will give New Ulm people some idea of the pleasure in store for them at this week's concert.
"Mrs. Zelle began her program with the G minor sonata by Tartini of 'Devil's Trill' fame and at once established happy contact with her audience through purity of tone, single-mindedness of purpose and grace of interpretation. The sonata was finely shaded for contrast of tempi and rhythm in its four well proportioned movements of classical texture. Of a classical order was also her second group made up of the Pugnani 'Praeludium and Allegro' in Kreisler's arrangement which severely taxed the artist's skill in long bowing and two charming Mozart pieces, and 'Andante' from 1756 and the minuet that has become so familiar in the Willy Burmester arrangement.

The Mozart morceaux were among Mrs. Zelle's most delightful efforts and yet were excelled by the Schumann 'Albumblatt,' played directly afterwards as an extra number. Her last group was modern and embraced the Wilhelmj arrangement of the prize song from Wagner's 'Mestersinger,' 'En Bateau' by Debussy and two of Burleigh's poetical mood pictures, 'Hills' and 'Thro' the Snow,' to all of which musical justice was done in an engaging manner.
The big audience was warmed up to much enthusiasm and there were many floral tributes.
