HAS BEEN GIVING CONCERTS IN CITIES FOR STARVING CHILDREN.

Arrangements have been made for a concert to be given at Turner Hall May 15 by Mrs. Emma Tester, dramatic soprano, formerly a singer at the Court of Royalty in Germany. Mrs. Tester comes from Stuttgart and has been engaged in this country for several months in the child welfare work. She will give concerts in a limited number of places before she returns to Germany.

Her melodious voice carried splendidly and it was hard to tell which to admire most, her wonderful voice or her splendid interpretation. In speaking of Mrs. Tester's appearances in Milwaukee, the *Milwaukee America* says that it certainly requires a great artist to fill their mammoth auditorium with her voice but hers carried to the farthest seat and utterly charmed the audience.

The program is in process of preparation and will be published in the next week's issue of the *Review*. The price of admission will also then be made known. It is planned to have local talent to furnish several numbers on the program to give it variety.

YOUNG GIRL INJURED MYSTERIOUSLY

A fourteen year old girl at Mankato, daughter of a family by the name of Anderson, reported that on her way home from the movies Saturday evening at 9 o'clock, she was followed by a middle aged man who asked her a question which she could not answer. When she was unable to give him the information he asked, he seized her by the throat and dragged her along the lawn of the State Teachers College to the back of the buildings. The girl said that she screamed and that he struck her twice on the head with some object, but that she struggled until she managed to get away from him, and running around the buildings she met some boys and asked them to help her home. The girl was covered with blood and was hysterical. When they succeeded in getting the child home she told her parents that a man had attacked her and the police were called but no one was found to answer the description which the girl gave. The doctor who attended her said that she was uninjured except for two scalp wounds which are not expected to be serious. It is not really known whether the girl was attacked by some brute or whether she was struck by an automobile as she at first said when she asked the boys to help her to her home.

ATTEMPTED MURDER AND SUICIDE AT WORTHINGTON

The shooting was the result of a family quarrel which had been going on for several months.
