Arthur Arndt of Springfield and Ed. Christiansen of Evan were visitors in New Ulm several days last week. They served on the grand jury during their stay here.


Mrs. B. G. Schulze of Nicollet underwent an operation at the Union Hospital recently for appendicitis. She is convalescing very nicely at the present time.
