

# TOMSCHIE DEFEATS NATT IN SPEEDY BOUT AT THEATRE

## Gibbon Man Shows Strength In Throwing Agile Opponent.

Before a large crowd of enthusiastic fans, Joe J. Tomsche, light heavy-weight wrestling contender from Gibbon, secured two out of three falls over Lou Natt, former senior wrestling instructor at the Great Lakes naval station, at the Turner Theater Friday night.

The first round lasted 36 minutes of as pretty wrestling as was ever seen. Tomsche showed lots of strength and a willingness to use it. Natt was quick, agile and demonstrated a broad understanding of the game. He displayed unusual strength in his many successful efforts at crawling out of difficult positions which might have been the Waterloo for one with a more massive physique.

### Tomsche Wins Round.

Natt somersaulted out of a back hammer at the end of four minutes, somersaulted and snapped out of a Half-Nelson before the end of five minutes and at the end of 30 minutes twisted out of a head lock in just the nick of time. Tomsche followed this successful effort with another lock which took Natt to the matt for a fall at the end of 35.50 minutes.

### Natt Throws Tomsche.

The second round was completed almost as soon as it started. Natt kicked Tomsche off of his feet right on the start, landing on top and pinning the Gibbon man with a head scissor and arm hold in just 62 seconds.

Tomsche won the bout in the third round taking Natt to the matt with a body scissor at the end of 6:30 minutes of wrestling.

### Preliminaries Held.

For the semi-windup, a bout was staged between Everett Gross of Pipestone and Henry Schroeder of Gibbon for one fall. It was won at the end of four minutes of half hearted wrestling with a body hold applied by Gross.

The preliminary bout between the Midget Marvels consisted of five fast and furious rounds of slugging which ended in a draw.

### Vogel is Complimented.

Alex Vogel, promoter, has been receiving the praise of fans for bringing such good wrestlers to New Ulm at Tomsche and Natt. Natt weighed about 180 pounds and Tomsche appeared 10 pounds heavier. Natt was fully one and one-half inches the taller. Mr. Vogel announces that it is his plan to continue these high class wrestling bouts throughout the winter.

It was the first game for the high school team and considering the fact that Comfrey has been playing for six weeks, having no football team to delay early practice, the showing by the New Ulm boys was remarkable. The Comfrey basket cagers, lighter than the local boys, proved themselves adept at passing the shooting.

### First Half Ends With Tie.

The New Ulm team was slow in getting started and did not catch its stride until the last half. The first quarter ended with a score of 7 to 1 in favor of the Comfrey visitors. At the end of the first half the count stood 9 to 9.

Throughout the second half it was a neck to neck race which kept the large crowd breathless with excitement. Whenever New Ulm scored the enthusiastic high school students under the leadership of Hildegard Hein, cheer leader, would give vent to their feelings with loud cheers.

### Defense Baffles.
