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WANDERER HELD ON MURDER CHARGES

CHICAGO, July 10—Four more charges of murder were preferred today by the state's attorney against Carl Wanderer, who confessed last night to killing his wife and a stranger. It has been ascertained that Wanderer wanted to inherit her estate and did not intend to kill her. "We shall go before the grand jury," said the state's attorney, and ask for his indictment on the charge of murder. It is one of the most cold-blooded and revolting crimes in Chicago's history. We shall ask for an immediate trial and the rope." Wanderer said that he did not wish to desert his wife and return to the army, but that he wished to be free.

One of the features which misled the police was the romance of the couple and their supposedly happy life. Wanderer had never smoked, chewed, drank or used slang and had only one love affair. This was with Ruth Johnson who afterwards became his wife. "She was the only girl I ever kissed," he told the police. He took her to church every Sunday and she had been a member of the church choir for eight years. She married after the ex-lieutenant returned from France.

Single Tax Group Do Not Want Wisconsin's Radical Senator

CHICAGO, July 10—The delegates summoned to the convention of 48 and representatives of the single tax movement got together today in a preliminary attempt to nominate a fusion third party candidate for President to run on platform satisfactory to both elements. The single tax group announced that their participation in the first day's session with the committee of 48 was only tentative. They declared it would not count unless Senator LaFollette of Wisconsin should be the presidential nominee. SENATOR HARDING WILL RECOGNIZE VICE PRESIDENT

MARION, Ohio, July 10—In order to benefit by the judgment of his "chief partner" Senator Harding announced today that if he was elected President the Vice President would be invited to participate in all the cabinet meetings. He said this would be done for the purpose of having "team work" between the President and the Vice President. It is the Senator's view that this would bring about a greater co-operation between the executive and legislative departments. Senator Harding said, "The country would greatly profit through this participation by the Vice President in the cabinet conference and administration. It would not only elevate the office of Vice President, but give the President the sound advice and able assistance of his chief partner in handling the nation's affairs."

Discoveries Lead to Belief In Foul Play in Mysteri- ous Disappearance

The further examination into the affairs of Fred N. Braley, cousin of C. G. Braley of St. Johnsbury, whose private papers, will, and some personal effects were found in a Portland, Oregon Park has brought little more to light. The discovery was made by sheerest accident by Ben Betchel, a socialist of Portland, who was searching through the roughest section of Braley Park when he fell through into a cache six feet long and two and one-half feet wide. At one end it was four feet deep, at the other, about two and one-half feet.
