CAPTURE YOUTH WITH 9 QUARTS OF WHISKEY

William Masters, a youth of Charleston, Mass., had carefully laid plans to smuggle nine quarts of whiskey from Canada into the states, but in framing his preparations, the sideration the probability of a wide awake customs officer interfering with him as he crossed the border and as a result Masters is now residing in Orleans County jail at Newport awaiting a call to appear in United States Court on a charge of unlawfully bringing whiskey into this country.

Masters was taken off the local train from Montreal by U. S. Customs Inspector Stanton Hitchcock on Saturday night after the officer had searched him and found nine quarts of the prohibited beverage, which Masters claimed he purchased in Montreal. Masters was held in jail overnight and was brought before United States Commissioner Walter H. Cleary on Monday morning but waived examination. Commissioner Cleary held him in \$200 bonds for appearance in United States Court. Masters was unable to furnish bail and was remanded to jail until he is able to secure the necessary money.

Funeral services were held in Burlington Sunday afternoon at the church of the First church and were in charge of Burlington Post No. 2 and Johnson Post of the American Legion. Dr. Rufus C. Flagg was pastor of the First Congregational church in this city during the years 1905 to 1911.

Ed. Brown of Sullivan, N. H., who was arrested recently for operating an automobile without a license and also for smuggling whiskey from Canada into the states, was due to appear in Municipal Court on Monday for a hearing on the first charge his time of bail having run out on Friday, July 9.
