**Truman Wheeler Near
Death from Auto Accident**

seeing the turn. When I noticed it, it was too late. I attempted to swing my car around suddenly, but it struck a bank first, tipping it part way over and throwing three of the men, who were riding on the tank. I think, Hunter, who was riding with me, jumped.

I carried Hunter and Sherer to the latter's house where their wounds were dressed. When I returned to the scene of the accident, I found that Coffran had taken Wheeler to his (Coffran's) house. I asked Coffran how serious Wheeler's injuries were and he replied that he wasn't badly injured. I did not know until this morning how serious his injuries were.

When Wakefield returned to the scene of the accident, he found several automobiles gathered there. Mr. and Mrs. Hunter had struck the guy rope which had been thrown across the road as a result of Wakefield's accident. Mr. Lang of Lyndonville and Wakefield immediately summoned Doctors Leonard and Brown, who treated the victims. It was found that Sherer had suffered a broken arm. Hunter received a big gash in his left hand, while Wheeler suffered internal injuries from which it was not expected he would recover.

Wakefield and Hunter motored to St. Johnsbury with Dr. David Brown of Lyndonville this morning to visit Wheeler. Hospital physicians held


