Rescues Man from Drowning at Newport

O. H. Johnson is the hero of a near drowning accident which occurred at C. R. Moore's boat landing in Newport.

Mr. Johnson had been fishing and was tying his boat when he heard a splash behind him, but some distance away.

A minute later he heard a cry for help and turning he saw a man's head disappearing from sight. He pulled as fast as possible and reached the man as he sank for the third time. Mr. Johnson reached down and caught the man's shoulder and succeeded in getting him ashore and restoring him to consciousness. His companion, who stood in the boat seemed so dazed, that he offered no assistance, though Johnson called to him to help with an oar.

The two young men came from Rock Island and took one of Mr. Moore's row boats during his absence and left before his return, so that their names could not be learned.
