Justices of Peace Appointed at Newport

In view of the approaching general election on next Tuesday, members of both Republican and Democratic parties, in joint session at Newport nominated the following men for justices of the peace: U. A. Harris, Republican; Carroll Huntington, Republican; J. K. Kirkpatrick, Democrat; G. C. Leavitt, Democrat; W. G. Lockhart, Republican; P. O. Miller, Democrat; C. W. Richmond, Republican; R. W. Spear, Republican, and Homer Thrasher, Republican.

The board of civil authority will meet at the city offices at Newport, Saturday afternoon and evening for the purpose of administering the freeman's oath to all voters who wish their names on the check list.

Contrary to the system of voting at the primaries, the voters at the general election next Tuesday may, if they so desire, split their votes. On November 2nd, a voter may vote in as many columns, as he wishes, providing he does not vote for more than one candidate for the same office.

Next Tuesday evening it is expected all the election returns will be received over a specially installed wire at the Premier Theatre. A collection will be taken up at the time to help defray part of the expenses incurred.

Woman With Vote Worth Half Doz Men, Says Grout

(Continued from page one) Our own rate of illiteracy is decreased; look after our own Bolshevists and Socialists first; and direct our first efforts to see that the whole body of our citizenship is Americanized.

Gov. Grout said that with one vote, one woman was worth a half dozen of men. That women would make road agents to ferret out existing evils and abolish them.

He appealed to the good woman to do her best and that she had a double duty to make up for the possible bad or unprincipled woman voter. His advice was to vote for the right principle, to sift all questions carefully, and look for the high moral side.

Gov. Grout dwelt at some length on the wonderful opportunity for women to vote for the first time on the problem that concerns the welfare of the whole world, the League of Nations.

"There are but few who do not believe that it is possible to have an association of nations to which every country may belong," the ex-governor said.

Ex-Gov. Grout said he had always been a believer in woman suffrage, and he was sure that the woman voter would look for ideals, not for sordid gain, vote the right principle—and for the Republican candidates.
