Don't Do It That Way

There is a conflict of opinion as to the validity of a ballot marked as advised by the Democratic Committee. There are two sure, safe methods for Republicans to mark their ballots.

Now suppose you wish to vote for candidates in different party columns.

Mr. William A. Rickett, Chairman, Republican Town Committee.

Dear Mr. Rickett:

I regretted to note that, in a recent letter to you, from one who, like myself, failed to secure the Republican nomination as County Senator at the primaries, the disappointed candidate announced his intention of casting at least a portion of the Democratic Ticket, and against so capable a man as the present Republican candidate for Town Representative. It appears to me that personal feelings ought not to enter into a matter of this kind, and that if any of us considered himself sufficiently identified with the Republican Party to seek a place on its ticket, he ought to be good enough sportsman and Republican to abide by the choice of the voters, and that all of us who occupy that position ought to work for the success of the entire ticket. Having held the position which you now occupy for two terms, I appreciate how quick our astute Democratic friends are to take advantage of any any such situation to secure votes for their own candidates, I for one do not wish to play into their hands, and take this opportunity to assure you of my own hearty support of the entire Republican ticket, and to urge my friends to give it similar support.

Our Democratic brethren are past masters in the use of a "smoke screen." Each year, some new device is adopted to secure Republican help to elect one or more Democrats to office in a town and county other wise overwhelmingly Republican. Republicans ought not to forget the past in this regard.

Four years ago, the Republican candidate for Town Representative was a lawyer, and according to Democratic propaganda of that year he had to be defeated for that reason: two years ago, the Democrats ran a lawyer for the same office, but their objection to lawyers had disappeared, and they camouflaged under the cry of "personal liberty" and other hot air products to secure votes.

This year, an "Independent" candidate for State's Attorney (although his name also appears as the regular Democratic candidate) is the hope of local Democracy. Let's hope the Republicans will not again be blinded by Democratic smoke. Is he a Democrat or is he "independent"? Wouldn't it be well to know how many times he has voted anything but the straight Democratic ticket, and how he intend to vote this year, before concluding that he is independent?

The so-called "Independent Committee", whose identity seems surrounded with obscurity, says to vote for the best candidate and they then proceed to state that a Democrat is the best! Wouldn't it be well for Republican voters to know who this "Independent Committee" is before accepting what they say? Certainly, if we consult any Democrat we meet, he will give us the same doctrine with respect to every Democratic candidate from the head of the party down. The question finally resolves itself into whether Republicans are going to permit other party men to decide for them who the best candidate is. I have nothing against any Democratic candidate, personally, whether he be on the town, state, or national ticket, but as a life-long Republican I should be more willing to trust to the wisdom of members of the Republican party to select a fit candidate for office, than to rely upon the choice of my Democratic friends.

There is considerable talk about a "third term" as applied to one of the Republican candidates. Before taking this talk too seriously, it seems to me Republicans ought to determine in their own minds, how many local Democrats would have been against a third term if the idol of their party, President Wilson, had been in sufficiently good health to have been their standard bearer this year. The answer to that question will determine whether "third term" talk is far wiser than to wishhead Democrats into voting the Democratic ticket.

The Democrats are urging that Republicans split their tickets to favor a Democrat, but has any one heard of any suggestion that any Democrat split his ticket to favor any Republican? Or does any one know of any Democrat who intends to do this notwithstanding there are plenty of good men on the Republican ticket? It's a new rule that doesn't work both ways, but the Democrats only wish to see you. Why do they want Republican voters to split? First, Because they hope thereby to secure more votes for some particular candidate, and, Second, Because they know that almost always in attempting to split tickets, more or less ballots are spoiled. Of course, if only Republicans attempt to split, all spoiled votes will be Republican, and the Democrats will profit accordingly on their entire ticket.

I earnestly hope that the Republican voters of St. Johnsbury and Caledonia County will see what is being attempted and not yield to this Democratic propaganda.
