## FIRST HUNTING ACCIDENT IS REPORTED

### Bolton Man Shot In Leg When Mistaken for a Deer

BOLTON, Dec. 7.—Harold Hayden, 27 years old, was shot in the left leg Monday when mistaken for a deer by Ray Guyette, member of another hunting party. Hayden's wound is not thought a serious one. The bullet entered about four inches above the knee. Hayden was hunting with Ray McCloud. They were standing on some ledges in the woods back of the Hayden, and noticed men about a half a mile away. Ray Guyette of Bolton and Glen Griffith of Waterbury, Guyette, when behind a thicket, saw a movement of Hayden's legs and mistaking the movement for a deer, shot. McCloud rendered first aid and helped Hayden to walk to his home. Dr. Fahy of Huntington attended him and he was taken to the Fanny Allen hospital at Winooski.

### LUCERNE, Switzerland, Dec. 7.—Former King Constantine said today he was expecting that the government would notify him tomorrow to return to Greece as a result of Sunday's plebiscite.

CONSTANTINE GETS 98 PER CENT OF GREEK VOTES  
PARIS, Dec. 7.—Ex-King Constantine received 98 per cent of the votes cast in Sunday's plebiscite on the question of his return to the throne. It was announced by the Greek legation here today. The voters numbered 300,000 more than the total taking part in the recent parliamentary election.

The three heads are representations of a devilish-looking gargoyle, a pretty fair representation of a Jackass, and a head that might have been that of a half-Ape man or woman with a very pointed and misshapen head. ## President's Message Does Not Endorse Soldiers' Bonus And No Mention of League

### (By the Associated Press) WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 7.—President Wilson's concrete recommendations to Congress in his annual message today were: Revision of the tax laws, with simplification of the income and profit taxes; independence for the Philippines; a loan to Armenia; economy in government appropriations and creation of a "workable budget system," cold storage and other laws, affecting the cost of living and the federal licensing of corporations as recommended in previous messages; rehabilitation training for disabled soldiers and sailors.

The president did not endorse bills. Nowhere did he refer to the League of Nations, nor did he refer to the peace treaty fight except by way of inference in his opening when he quoted Abraham Lincoln. "Let us have faith that right makes might;" (Continued on page five)



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**SENATE TO ACT ON FARMER RELIEF LEGISLATION**  
WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—Immediate consideration by the senate of farmer relief legislation was considered probable today with the report of a joint resolution by the agricultural committee reviving the finance corporation and directing the Federal Reserve Board to permit extension of liberal credits to farmers. The chairman of the committee announced he would urge immediate action on the resolution and members of the committee expressed confidence that sufficient votes were in sight to insure its adoption.
