SAYS CLEMENCEAU CALLED WILSON A PRO-GERMAN

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 24—The statement that Premier Clemenceau called President Wilson a pro-German at the peace conference was made last night by President Bowman of the American Geographical society who was the territorial advisor of the American peace commission.

Speaking at the Public Ledger Forum on peace conference, he said that the President once called the members of the American commission together and said "I am in trouble. The French want the left bank of the Rhine and the Saar basin, but I will not agree to it. I do not know as I shall ever see him again or whether we will ever get peace. Clemenceau has called me a pro-German and has left the room."


