

**First Vermont Ready  
Says Adj-Gen. Johnson**

The First Vermont could be  
ready on two hours notice if any  
need arises, said Adjutant-Gen-  
eral Herbert Johnson to-day in  
answer to a question regarding  
possible use of troops in connec-  
tion with the railroad strike set  
for early November by union lead-  
ers. No orders or letters of any  
kind regarding the use of troops  
in a possible emergency have gone  
out. Adjutant-General Johnson  
said.  
In answer to a question about a  
rumor that the National Guard  
would man trains in event of a  
strike, he said "if we are called  
out to man trains we will do our  
part."

WASHINGTON—Government  
officials awaiting official report  
from the labor board before taking  
the next step.  
Cleveland—Brotherhood chiefs  
returned to their headquarters and  
continued their plans.

ST. LOUIS—Managers of the  
Southwestern roads met to ar-  
range their program for operation  
of the roads if a strike occurs.

SAN ANTONIO—Six hundred  
members of the Brotherhood of  
Railway Trainmen employed on  
International and Great Northern  
railroads prepared to walk out  
at noon tomorrow, the first union au-  
thorized to quit under the strike  
orders issued here last Saturday.  
In union circles today was a  
seeming resignation to the belief  
that the strike is now inevitable,  
unless President Harding assumes  
the initiative with some drastic  
step.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21—  
Whether to resort to the war pow-  
ers of the federal government to  
maintain railway transportation in  
the event of a nation-wide strike  
of railroad workers is understood  
to have been under consideration  
today by the administration.

TOPEKA, Kan., Oct. 21—In the  
event a railroad strike becomes ef-  
fective the state government in  
Kansas will operate the lines with-  
in the state, if it becomes neces-  
sary under the Kansas Industrial  
court law, Governor Allen an-  
nounced today.

CHICAGO, Oct. 21—Chicago  
packers today began storing fresh  
meats for emergency use in event  
of a railroad strike. Preparations  
are being made, it was said, to  
stock strategic distributing centers  
to the maximum.

CHICAGO, Oct. 21—Lack of  
any provision by the unions for  
suspending the railroad strike cal-  
led for October 30 made it impos-  
sible to accept the plan offered by  
the United States Railroad Labor  
Board yesterday, it was said today  
in union circles. The board, it was  
said, presented three proposals.  
1.—The railroad to make a re-  
duction in freight rates correspond-  
ing to the wage reduction of July 1,  
less such reductions as  
have already been made since that  
date.  
2.—The railroads to refrain from  
asking the United States Railroad  
Labor Board for a further wage  
reduction until the last cut has  
been translated into rate reduction.  
3.—The unions to suspend or  
withdraw their strike order.  
The five union presidents were  
willing to accept the first two but  
declared they had made no ar-  
rangement for suspending their  
strike and any settlement must be  
made before October 30 or the  
walkout would automatically be-  
come effective.

SEND BRITISH WARSHIP  
CALWIPSO TO LISBON  
LONDON, Oct. 21.—The Ad-  
miralty, it was announced today,  
is sending the warship Calwipso to  
Lisbon in consequence of represen-  
tation of British firms and British  
residents of the Portuguese capital.  
They express apprehension  
over recent political developments.

**Auto Accident  
On Main Street**

A collision early Friday morning  
opposite the home of Dr. F. E.  
Farmer on Main street drew a  
small crowd which was soon in-  
creased by the arrival of a corpora-  
tion attorney, a policeman and  
the attorney's clerk. The latter  
took the names of all the specta-  
tors, the attorney marked the  
traces of the truck with sawdust  
and the route of the little car with  
paper, while the policeman listen-  
ed to the story of the accident. It  
all happened when the big Stan-  
dard Oil truck driven by William  
B. Roman, ran into a Ford  
owned and driven by George W.  
Badger. The accident occurred  
just as Dr. Farmer was backing  
out of his yard and the big truck  
as it proceeded south turned to  
the right and struck the Ford car  
which was also at the extreme  
right of the road but going in a  
northerly direction. E. H. Chase  
was riding in the back seat of the  
Ford carrying a magnet to a  
local garage. When the accident  
happened the magnet was jam-  
med up against his leg. His in-  
juries were only slight. The  
Standard Oil truck had a dent on  
its front fender while the Ford  
car came out second best having  
a severe dent on the body, while  
the running board and part of the  
fender on one side of the car was  
smashed. After separating the  
broken parts from the Ford it was  
able to proceed on its journey  
under its own power.
