

## IZAACK WALTON'S COTTAGE MAY BE PRESERVED

American Fishermen Start Fund to Save Home

A group of Americans most of them enthusiastic fishermen, are organizing for the purpose of raising funds with which the cottage of Izaak Walton, patron saint of followers of the reel and rod, may be preserved. The cottage is located at Shallowford, England, and is reputed to be the spot where the famous angler thought over the works which he left behind.

Those who have signified that they will aid Mayor T. A. Dunn and other officials of Stafford, where Walton was born, are for the most part friends and business associates of the late Julien Tappan Davies, attorney and trustee of the Mutual Life Insurance Company. Mr. Davies was an enthusiastic fisherman and his friends have conceived the idea of having a tablet erected in his memory at the cottage.

Those who are furthering the idea ask that the fish men of the United States who have browsed about in "The Compleat Angler," written by Walton, contribute a small amount so that the cottage may be repaired and preserved.

Mayor Dunn and the other local officials of Stafford were attempting to raise a fund of some 300 pounds for the purpose.

A brief note in a London paper to the effect that the fund was in process of being raised came to the attention of Major Archibald G. Thatcher of Barry, Wainwright, Thatcher and Simmers of New York. This started the plan to have the American friends of Mr. Davies contribute toward the work. Major Thatcher is a son-in-law of Mrs. Davies.

The English officials said that they would be very happy to have Americans contribute toward the fund. Mayor Dunn declared that he was greatly in favor of a plan to collect a piscatorial library and place it in the cottage. It was thought that the Walton place might become a world shrine for fishermen. Joseph S. Auerbach of Davies, Auerbach and Cornell, the firm of the late fishing enthusiast will receive contributions at his office, 34 Wall street, as will Major Thatcher at 59 Wall street.
