Some Impressions of Judge Prince.

The GAZETTE man yesterday interviewed some of the prominent people of Las Vegas in regard to the recent charges made and published against Hon. L. Bradford Prince.

JUDGE W. D. LEE said: "I think these charges very uncalled for. I am not sure that there is not a law in this territory imposing a penalty upon such publications. Prince is a man of more than ordinary ability, and his decisions are fully up to the standard of those of judges generally, and he is universally regarded as an honest man. He having come from a state where a very liberal code practice exists, it would necessarily take him some time to become thoroughly acquainted with a technical common law practice such as we have in this territory. We are under the old English common law practice, and his practice in New York was under the code. In his rulings, which have been most seriously criticized, he has been more frequently right than wrong, and although they were born of this liberal code, they have been better calculated to observe the ends of justice than to suit the technical quibbles of certain attorneys, seeking advantage under the old common law practice. Judge Prince is now becoming familiar with our statutes and practice, and it would take any man accustomed to a code practice as long as it has taken him to acquire this knowledge. Again, while the appointing power is in Washington we would be far more likely to get a worse than a better judge than Prince has made. The interests of justice would not be in any sense subserved by the change, although it might gratify some disaffected persons. His predecessor in office was a tyrant on the bench. His decisions have been almost universally reversed, and his subsequent history has evinced his corruption as well as his incompetency. He held his office for a year and held only one court at Santa Fe, and then he hurried through the business of a two weeks' term in a week, and the interests of justice suffered in his hands. And this experience should be a warning to those who are urging a change now."

CAPT. L. C. FOIT said: "I don't care to say anything at this stage of the game. I don't know anything of the cause of complaint against Judge Prince, if there be any. I have no fault to find of him myself, and want to keep out of the fight, as I am a comparative stranger in this city."

COL. J. A. LOCKHART. I have to say that so far as I know, Judge Prince is a capable judge, and an honorable man. I never heard of any objection to him, and supposed he was giving entire satisfaction. I learn, since I came back, that Judge Stevenson is a candidate for the position. He is a personal friend of mine, and in case of Prince's removal I should be in favor of Stevenson's appointment, as I know him to be a number one man. Mr. F. M. SWEAR, of San Marcial, was in Col. Lockhart's office, and said: We know Judge Prince, and we like him first-rate. We are satisfied with him, and don't want any change.

MR. GEO. J. DINKEL. I don't have much lawing to do, but he suits me.

CAPT. J. S. FITZGERRELL. You may just set me down as Judge Prince's friend. I am a candidate for the Optic's chromo.

JUDGE D. P. SHIELDS. I decline to be interviewed to say anything against Judge Prince or for him. I am not a candidate for any office. I am not working for anybody or against anybody. I have confidence in the government at Washington, and believe they will do the right thing for us, while we are a territory. Judge Prince's decisions are on record, and speak for themselves. I know of no charge of corruption against him that can be sustained. I am opposed to newspaper controversy about judicial officers, it only brings the judiciary into disrepute.

COL. T. B. MILLS. I think he has made an impartial and honorable judge, and no man ever came to this Territory that has done more for its advancement than he has. He has brought a number of good men here, and has at all times taken a lively interest in everything that would contribute to its development.

JUDGE WM. STEELE. I don't know enough of Judge Prince, as a judge, to express an opinion.

JOHN F. BOSTWICK. I regard him as unusually incompetent, even for a frontier judge. He has expressed himself contemptuously upon the bench in regard to the common law practice and pleading under which system it is required that every judge in this Territory administer the functions of his office. My opinion is that he is under the influence of Catron, and that

Catron lets him into some of his speculations, and I advised one of the clients of this office in an important case to retain Catron on that account, which he did. The most infamous thing about it all is this, and you can see it as well as I can. This is an important county as there is in the Territory, and all the records of the District Court are kept at Santa Fe, so that in examining titles here you have got to delay an opinion until you can write, or go to the expense of telegraphing to Santa Fe to find out if there are any judgments against the parties who owned it. We have no clerk here at all, and no deputy clerk, and the reason we have no clerk here is that Clancy, Clerk of the District, is an importation of Prince's, and of course if Clancy had a deputy clerk here it would divide his fees, and rather than this should occur the interests of this county are jeopardized and injured. One result of having no clerk here is, that except in cases of attachment and replevin, we have to send to Santa Fe for process, and this delay often gives the defendant a chance to get away before it can be served. Judge Prince was spoken to on this subject and declined to give any relief. Another illustration of his subordination to the Santa Fe outfit is, that during three terms of court he has appointed T. B. Catron to prosecute in this county, entirely ignoring the local bar. My idea is that Prince is not honest. At the last term of court some of the lawyers wrote a note in imitation of a feminine hand and left it on his desk, signing a certain woman's name, and asking him to come up immediately, and he adjourned court and went. I think there is no doubt that what little usefulness he ever had as a Judge has ended. I want to disclaim any personal feeling of ill will whatever against Judge Prince, but he has treated the bar of this county with such arrogant contempt that he has forced us to make a fight against him, and we propose to continue it until we fetch him; and if we get the worst of it we don't propose to kick. I am not one of those attorneys who have for the past two years stigmatized him as an ignoramus and then signed a petition to retain him."

F. A. MANZANARES. Judge Prince is a good man and should be retained. I like him both socially and as a Judge.

MR. W. M. WHITELAW. Well, in the first place, I regard Judge Prince as absolutely incompetent, by reason of his want of study and practice as a lawyer. I don't know anything of his early life and his training as a lawyer, except as indicated on the bench, and his rulings and general conduct as a Judge bear no evidence whatever of his having given much attention to the law, either as a student or as a practitioner. Another objection to him is his favoritism, which leads him to bend inflexible the rules of law and principles of practice to accommodate his favorites.

Do you want to specify? I should rather not, as it might incense members of the bar against me with whom I am on good terms. Another illustration of his favoritism is that during the vacancy in the office of Attorney-General, he appointed a Santa Fe lawyer to prosecute in this county; and this is an offense which the bar of this rich and populous county cannot afford to forgive. I think his refusal to appoint a clerk here another evidence of his favoritism. Judge Bristol, in the Third district, required his clerk to appoint a deputy in each county in the district, and any approach to fairness on Prince's part would have demanded the same thing at his hands in this county. Again, he required the defense in criminal cases to open the argument. This is illogical and unprecedented outside of this territory. His excusals that his predecessor established the rule. I think he should have the courage and manliness to adopt such rules as are logical and in keeping with the usual course of practice, even though it conflicts with rules his predecessors have established.

Do you know of any efforts being made to secure his removal? Yes, I do; and I hope and believe that they will culminate in his removal.

MR. LOUIS SULZBACHER was found in his office, busy as usual. He said briefly: I can say that Judge Prince is a good and honorable man. I could not say otherwise and tell the truth. If he sometimes makes mistakes it is a sign that he is not infallible. I don't agree with his decisions always, especially when he decides against my clients.

H. ROMERO, SHERIFF OF SAN MIGUEL COUNTY. Judge Prince is one of the best judges New Mexico has ever had since I have any knowledge of affairs here.

COL. W. G. FRANKLIN, OF SOCORRO. Accidentally found out ye reporter's mission, and said: I have never heard of any complaint against him.

DON MIGUEL OTERO. Let me out of this. This is a fight for the lawyers, and I have nothing to say.

JUDGE O. P. LYDON was out.

MR. M. SALAZAR. I have read the communication of Bostwick and Whitelaw, entitled a "Poke at Prince," which appeared in the Optic of the 22d inst. That communication is, to say the least, an uncalled for in-

sult, not only to Judge Prince, but to all the members of the bar of San Miguel county. To characterize the attorneys as "bootlicks," simply because they exercise their right as free citizens by expressing their opinion and wish, is in my judgment silly and ungentlemanly. If Bostwick and Whitelaw are dissatisfied with Judge Prince, it is none of my affair, nor is it Bostwick and Whitelaw's business to put a "poko," as we say in Spanish, or interfere with my opinion. As far as I am concerned I am satisfied with Judge Prince, and I would be sorry if he were removed from his present position of Chief Justice of the Territory.

With regard to his fitness as a judge, taking everything into consideration, and bearing in mind that no man is infallible, I consider Judge L. Bradford Prince thoroughly competent for the position he holds, and as far as I know, deriving my knowledge from a great many prominent persons residing in this District of the Territory, the native inhabitants of New Mexico like Judge Prince better than any judge they ever had in this Territory. There is another reason why I like Judge Prince, and would be sorry if removed, and that is, because ever since he came to the Territory he has taken a warm and deep interest in the prosperity of New Mexico and its inhabitants. Through him a great deal of money has been invested in this Territory by Eastern capitalists.

Many people from the East have come to settle, and he has gone so far as to invest his own money. Now, I think the loss of such men will be felt by the inhabitants of the territory, and I venture to assert that if the question of the removal of Judge Prince is left for the people to decide, Judge Prince shall be Chief Justice of New Mexico as long as he pleases. That, sir, is my private opinion publicly expressed as usual.

COL. G. W. STONEROAD, who takes an active interest in all public questions, expressed himself decidedly favorable to Judge Prince. He said that he pushes legal business through with a vigor which has not been characteristic of New Mexican Judges, and his decisions are eminently fair and just. Taking all in all, he is the best Judge we have had in New Mexico.

A. B. SAGER, ESQ. said Judge Prince is well qualified for the position, and is the best man we are liable to get.
