

A Kentucky Killing

Owensville, Ky., Nov. 12.—Another foul murder was committed in this county line, over in Flemingsburg, day before yesterday, the man who did the killing being a citizen of this county, making the fifth killed here in less than two months. Wm. R. Royce has been keeping a young woman, Miss Jennie Burk, in Fleming county for over two years, she having had a child by him. On the day of the killing Royce went over to see the girl and found Jacob Rogers, a young man from this county, visiting her. They sat and talked a short time, when Rogers proposed to go to a vacant house some half a mile distant and get some whisky, saying that there was a boy there selling it. They went, but found no boy there, and still friendly, started to return, when about 100 yards from the house Rogers drew a pistol and fired three shots at Royce, all of which took effect, one entering the back on the right side, coming out about an inch to the right of the right nipple, another entering the left side of the back, passing through and coming out just to the left of the left nipple. Royce then turned and grabbed Rogers' pistol, when the third shot struck his right arm, tearing it badly. This is the wounded man's statement. He says they were perfectly friendly, and no cause is known to him for the shooting. He was not armed, and had nothing to defend himself with. Rogers still talks, and swears he will not be taken. He is desperate and dangerous when roused, and there will be trouble when the officers attempt to arrest him. He is now at his home in this county, and says he did the shooting. Rogers still talks, and the woman Burke was evidently the cause. A report has just reached here that Royce died last night.

Butchering the Blacks.

Vicksburg, Miss., Nov. 12.—Information was received here this evening to the effect that the forty negroes who took refuge in the residence of Ed Vance, at Marion, Miss., after the riot at that place yesterday, fled to the woods late last night, and were closely pursued by a body of armed men from Kemper county and Meridian. The negroes have not since been seen or heard from, and the prevailing opinion is that the last one of them were slain by their pursuers in the woods.

From all sources the news comes that the killing of A. D. Harvey, the Democratic candidate for Assessor, by the negroes, in the first instance, was an unprovoked murder. Harvey and Barrett were buried at Meridian today in the same grave. Great excitement still prevails, and an armed body of men set out this evening in search of Ed Vance, a white Republican, who fled shortly after the riot at Marion, and who is considered by all as chiefly responsible for the murder of Harvey, Barrett and Cogers, and the happening of the whole affair. Negroes through out the entire section of country surrounding Marion, have dispersed and are not to be seen anywhere.

Will Vance, son of Ed Vance, and a brother to John Vance who was killed yesterday, is now in jail, but will probably be taken out of jail to-night and hanged by the citizens of the place.

Snaken Ship.

Buffalo, Nov. 12.—The schooner Carlingford, with wheat from Detroit to Buffalo and the steam barque Brunswick, bound up the lake with 16,000 bushels of coal from Buffalo, collided when off Port Colborne this morning, both sinking soon after. The crew of the Carlingford, consisting of Captain Holmes and six men, escaped after a pull of twenty miles in a rough sea. All escaped with the exception of a sailor named Edward Conway, who ran back after something when the vessel was sinking. Three of the crew of the Brunswick were also lost. The Brunswick is valued at \$100,000 insured for \$70,000. The Carlingford is insured for \$20,000 and the cargo of wheat for \$25,000.

Baltimore, Nov. 12.—Frank W. White of New York and George Holden and their backers met to-day to make the final arrangements of the prize fight for \$5,000 and the feather-weight championship of America. Long Point, the famous battle ground of the fight between John C. Heenan and John Morrissey was chosen as the place of meeting and Wednesday, the 19th inst. appointed as the day for the contest. It is understood that Patsy Shepherd and Billy Edwards will second White, while Davney Harris and Arthur Chambers will second Holden. The pugilists leave to-morrow night for Erie, Pennsylvania, where two boats will carry them to the battle ground.

French Visitors in Porkopolis.

Cincinnati, Nov. 12.—The French visitors were called on this morning by Mayor Means and informally welcomed to the city. Afterwards, at his invitation, they appeared on 'change where they were warmly received by the merchants. This afternoon they spent in visiting places of interest in the city and suburbs.

Blown to Atoms.

Cincinnati, November 9.—A report came up town at about dusk this evening that a man in East Sixth street had kicked a cigar box which he had found lying on the sidewalk, and that it proved to be an infernal machine and blew him to atoms. The facts are, that John Murray, a roofer, went on the roof of a shanty in that locality, and there found a cigar box on the roof containing a yellowish-white substance, which he proceeded to examine, when it exploded, tore out his eyes, tore off his right arm, shattered the right side of his body and broke every glass in the window of the house. He was caught on the roof by a colored attendant and carried to the hospital, where he died an hour later. The explosion is that the substance was fulminating powder, and it is known that it was placed there innocently by a boy who worked in a fireworks factory, and who had placed it there from the window of his room in an adjacent building to avoid danger to persons who cared for his room. Only about four weeks ago his mother in sweeping the boy's room had exploded a small quantity of this same sort of fulminate, which shattered the windows and damaged the furniture and endangered the mother's life.

National Capital Notes.

GILFILLAN'S NOTICE.

Washington, November 12.—Gilfillan, Treasurer of the United States, has ordered that no bonds deposited as security for the circulation of public deposits, shall hereafter be surrendered or be allowed to pass from the custody of the Treasury office, except upon the surrender of circulating notes, deposit of lawful money deposited upon other bonds in the name of the Treasury of the United States in trust or in care of the depository bank upon order of the Secretary of the Treasury.

ONE HUNDRETH AND FIFTH CALL.

At the close of business to-day there had been \$9,846,950 of United States bonds received at the Treasury under the 105th call.

EVIL EFFECT OF THE READJUSTER SUCCESS.

London, November 12.—The Economist says that Virginia funded bonds have fallen six per cent. because of the success of the Readjuster party in the recent election.

All is not Well that Ends in Well.

Joplin, Mo., Nov. 12.—Melville Bailey, engineer for Messrs. Green & Shoen, on Cox diggings, south of the city, met with a sudden death yesterday afternoon. He had descended the pump shaft, in which there were fifteen feet of water, for the purpose of tightening up some bolts in the pipe. While thus engaged he must have slipped and fell, striking his head against the side of the shaft with such force as to cause unconsciousness, in which state he fell into the water and was drowned. His remains were raised to the surface, and an inquest held over them this morning. They were sent to Ft. Scott, Kan., for interment, in which place he formerly resided. The deceased was 24 years of age and unmarried.

The Dallas and Wichita Line.

Dallas, Tex., November 9.—Capt. S. Adams, of the banking office of Adams, Denham & Wells, in New York, telegraphs home to-day that he has purchased the interest of J. Graves, of Boston, in the Dallas and Wichita railroad for ex-Governor John C. Brown and others, thus stopping the sale of Dallas and Wichita bonds. Captain Adams says that the bonds will be issued, and states that the road will now be pushed on from Denton northward via Decatur to the projected terminus of the Wichita country.

A Fearful Railroad Accident.

Port Jervis, N. H. Nov. 12.—A terrible accident occurred this morning on the Erie, ten miles east of this place, killing three men instantly. Two freight trains, each with a passenger train with an engine at each end of the train. The engine of the rear train ran into the pusher of the forward train, driving it into the caboose, and killing Conductor Done instantly. Jerome Grover and Mark Cox, both engineers of the engines colliding, were also instantly killed. Both the trains were badly wrecked.

The Chicago, Texas and Mexican.

Dallas, Tex., Nov. 12.—The Directors of the Chicago, Texas and Mexican Central Railroad met this afternoon, but no business of material importance was transacted. In conversation with Mr. Daniel H. Hale, of Chicago, President of the road, he expressed the opinion that Dallas would be the leading city of Texas within a very short time, owing to the numerous railroads building out of the city, and because of the thrift and energy displayed by her citizens.

About a Disastrous Descent of an Elevator.

New York, Nov. 12.—The hotel elevator accident here creates a general feeling of uneasiness. It is estimated that 3,000 people ride daily, Sundays excepted, in our elevators. There are about 500 passenger elevators in New York, and that among all the passengers and freight elevators in the city and neighborhood one wire breaks in an average of each week and the car is caught by the safety break without accident. It is many years since a car missed its hold and fell to the bottom.

Leonard's Rogus Business.

Detroit, Nov. 12.—Dr. John M. Leonard, a practicing physician in Searles township, Calhoun county, for forty years was arraigned before a United States Commissioner to-day and pleaded guilty to having made and circulated bogus silver coins. He was committed to await trial. Officers seized a trunk full of dies and apparatus for making counterfeit coins of every description from a nickle to a dollar. Leonard is seventy-four years old.

Charitable Patti.

New York, Nov. 12.—Adelina Patti has consented to give a concert Wednesday next, the proceeds of the concert to go to the Michigan relief fund. The following is the form of the invitation to the concert telegraphed to gentlemen whose names are appended:

To the Mayor of New York.—The Committee for the relief of the sufferers by the late Michigan fire, and the honor to invite you to a benefit to be given by Madame Adelina Patti Wednesday evening, at Steinway Hall.

Heavy Investments.

Dallas, Texas, Nov. 12.—Mr. Benne, president of the South American Mortgage Company, is in the city and has made arrangements with Colonel J. B. Simpson, fiscal agent for the company in Texas, to loan \$200,000 on lands and other property in North Texas. Mr. Benne has also received from the United States and he says Texas is the best State he has struck for investment. Suits aggregating \$75,000 were filed against the trunk railroad to-day and others will be filed to-morrow.

Fatal Fall.

Indianapolis, November 12.—One of the traveling engines on the trestle work of the new state house fell at 1 o'clock to-day a distance of twenty-five feet, caused by the timbers giving away. The engineer, named Smith, is probably fatally injured. No others were hurt.

Snipes Who Did Not Want to be Bagged.

Plainsfield, Mo., November 12.—J. L. Snipes, a prominent real estate and pension agent, has left home for parts unknown, to avoid arrest for swindling pensioners.

Apparent Majorities.

Albany, November 12.—The Evening Journal says: The apparent majorities are as follows: For Carr, 11,255; Davemort, 12,310; Russell, 11,846; Seymour, 6,889; Finch, 7,571; Maxwell, Democratic candidate for Treasurer, 21,727.

Bad Baking Powder.

Detroit, November 12.—J. A. Poorman, of Paw Paw, and two children, ate pancakes Tuesday last mixed with arsenic used by mistake for baking powder. Poorman has since died and it is now reported that the children cannot recover.

Ten Persons Drowned.

New York, November 12.—A private telegram from Troy, New York, reports that a small ferry-boat plying between that city and West Troy, capsized this evening and ten persons drowned.

He Will Probably Get Another Trial.

Chicago, November 12.—The Supreme Court this morning granted a stay of proceedings in the case of Keenan, the murderer, and his attorneys are confident of getting a new trial.

Elections Make Dull the Business.

New York, Nov. 12.—Business in the general market the past-week has been rather light owing to the annual elections.

Texas Trunk Line.

Dallas, Texas, Nov. 12.—Information was received to-day that a syndicate to form a construction company had been organized in Boston for the purpose of completing the construction of the Texas Trunk Railroad. One million dollars has been subscribed, and the difficulties of this road will soon be adjusted.

Federician.

New York, November 12.—John Federician, of Chicago, and Charles Rowell, of England, have deposited the preliminary stake of \$300 each for a 25-hours walking match to take place at Chicago November 25th.
