THANKSGIVING day was observed by
Americans in Berlin by a grand banquet
at which Mr. Everett, First Secretary of
the Legation, presided. Prominent
German officials were among the guests.

ARRANGEMENTS are being made for
memorial services in honor of the late
President Garfield, to be held in both
houses of Congress. They will be very
simple, consisting of orations and a poem,
interspersed with music.

A REPRESENTATIVE of the Hungarian
Government, in the person of E. Pekar,
is visiting this country for the purpose
of collecting agricultural and mining
statistics for publication under the
auspices of the government.

JOSEPH BILLINGS disposed of Col. Bob
Ingersoll in the following quaint man-
ner: "I wouldn't give five cents to
hear Bob Ingersoll on 'The Mistakes of
Moses,'" but would give \$500 to hear
Moses on the mistakes of Bob Ingersoll."

THE late John Amory, Lowell, left
\$30,000 to Harvard College for the botan-
ical garden, on condition that it be
called the "Lowell Botanic Garden," in
memory of his grandfather, who started
the first subscription for that depart-
ment. He also left \$20,000 to be
applied to the purchase of books for the
library.

THE oldest bishop of the English
speaking churches in this country is
Rev. Dr. Smith, of Kentucky, now the
presiding bishop of the Protestant Epis-
copal church of the United States. He
was consecrated October 31, 1832.
Should he live one year longer he will
celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of his
episcopate.

THE report of the Director of the
Mint, relative to production of the pre-
cious metals for the fiscal year 1880,
shows that the estimated production of
\$30,000,000 in gold has been sustained,
and that the value of silver produced
during 1880, namely, \$39,200,000,
exceeds the estimate of the director by
\$1,500,000. Silver bullion purchased
during the fiscal year for coinage
amounted to 45,262,571 standard ounces
worth at its coinage value \$28,232,810,
and the deposit of silver coin and bul-
lion not of domestic production was \$2,-
507,706, of which probably \$2,000,000
was purchased and used.

THE entire gold product of the United
States is less than seventy-two cents
per head of the population of this coun-
try. The entire annual product of gold
throughout the world, putting it at
\$100,000,000, is only equal to about sev-
en cents per head of the world's popu-
lation. From this annual supply of
gold one-third must be deducted for
other purposes, leaving the amount to
be used for money at not exceeding five
cents per head.

WE have more copper ore than Col-
orado, Arizona and Lake Superior
combined, and in a few years can give
the world a large percentage of the
world's supply. In our copper we have
perhaps a source of wealth not inferior
in value and importance to our
mines of gold and silver.—White Oaks
Golden Era.
