This is the last opportunity Don Tranquillo Luna will have of representing New Mexico. A better man will take the seat next Congress.

WHITE OAKS coal is beginning to attract attention. There is undoubtedly excellent coal in that locality and it will require but a short time to bring them into prominence. SPAIN is to have the next international exposition. It is to be held at Madrid in April, 1883. These expositions are becoming quite numerous in various parts of the world.

Over sixty corn canneries in the state of Maine annually put up 12,000,000 cans. An exchange has made an estimate of the cost at which corn is so prepared for the market. The farmer is said to receive three cents for the corn contained in the can, the tin solder cost three cents, and the remainder four or five cents, goes to the manufacturer for putting up and marketing. The cans contain twenty-six ounces of corn, so that farmers raise from 1,000 to 3,000 cans per acre, the average being about 1,500, giving a cash value of \$46. There are several factories in Massachusetts, but Maine is said to put up one-third of the corn canned in the country.

REAR ADMIRAL ROBERT H. WYMAN, who died Saturday, was one of the most distinguished of our naval officers. He was born in New Hampshire in 1822. His earliest service in the navy was in the Mexican war. He participated in the bombardment of Vera Cruz, but served principally on the west coast. At the beginning of the war he ranked only as lieutenant, and did not receive his commission as captain until 1866. During the war he made a good reputation for gallantry and ability. He commanded the Pawnee at the battle of Port Royal, but his most important services were on the Potomac and Hapahanannock, while in command of the Potomac flotilla. For these services he was frequently highly praised in the official dispatches. In 1872 he was promoted to be commodore and later he was made rear admiral. For several years he was in charge of the hydrographic office in Washington, where his thorough, careful work gave him an enviable reputation among scientists. CONGRESS assembled on the 4th inst. and the result of the last election has put a new phase on the character of laws to be acted upon during the few months yet belonging to this Congress. Two years ago the republican party went into power under the leadership of James A. Garfield, with a flourish of trumpets. It was largely in the majority in the lower house and had a clear working majority in the senate. Two short years, however, have wrought great changes. What were the direct causes of these changes is not easily divined. Whether the legislation has been such as to cause dissatisfaction among the laboring classes or whether the rule of the bosses is the hidden question. Most likely, however, the iron rule of the bosses in politics was the cause. For in all the states where these rings have been the most relentless defeat of the republican party was the most sweeping and thorough.
