General Order,

1. THE FOLLOWING EXTRACT from the Act amendatory of the exemption Act, passed by the last Congress of the Confederate States is published for the information and guidance of those whom it may concern—

(EXTRACT.)
Sec. 4. "In addition to the State officers exempted by the Act of Oct. 11, 1862, there shall be exempted all State officers whom the Governor of any State may claim to have exempted for the due administration of the Government and laws thereof; but this exemption shall not continue in any State after the adjournment of the next regular session of its Legislature, unless such Legislature shall, by law, exempt them from military duty in the Provisional Army of the Confederate States."

II. Militia officers are hereby exempted from the operation of the Conscription Act, so long as they yield prompt obedience to the orders issued from this office. The services of refractory and negligent officers will not be considered as necessary for the due administration of the Government, and laws of the State."

III. Commanding officers of the Militia will communicate this order to the officers under their command.



SHARP SHOOTERS.

Through permission of the Confederate States War Department I am engaged in raising a

BATTALION OF SHARP SHOOTERS to serve during the war, and to be received directly into the Confederate States service.

In the Spring a large number of Troops will be mustered out of service, leaving a serious gap in our army—their places must be filled—the enemy must be resisted—battles must be fought—victories must be won, or our Independence will be lost—one country ruined, our people doomed. **Loan for the defence of the
Confederate States.**

BY a communication from the Hon. C. G. Memminger, Secretary of the Treasury of the Confederate States, the undersigned have been requested to act as "the Central Board of Commissioners for the State of North Carolina," to present to the attention of the citizens of this State the Loan authorized by the act of Congress of the Confederate States, approved February 28th, 1861, and solicit subscriptions to the same; and we are further requested to appoint Local Commissioners at such places as we may deem advisable, to act for the purpose indicated.

The gross amount of this loan cannot exceed \$15,000,000, of which sum \$5,000,000 was called for in March last, and a second call for the remainder is now made.

Bonds with coupons for accruing interest in sums from \$1,000 to \$50, or stock certificates in the usual form (if preferred) will be issued. The interest is eight per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually at all of our principal cities.

The principal money is payable ten years after September 1st next, the Government reserving the right (upon giving three months public notice) of paying any portion of this Loan at the expiration of five years after September 1st.

Subscriptions will be received in current Bank notes at par, or certificates of deposit of any one of the Banks of the State in good credit at the Capital, and the subscriber will then receive a receipt furnished by the Treasury Department, which entitles him to its exchange for Bonds or Stock to bear interest from date.

This Loan is authorized for the support of the Government, and to provide for the defence of the Confederate States of America, and it certainly cannot be necessary that we should make an extended appeal to North Carolina to induce them promptly to come to the aid of their Government in the crisis now existing.

GENERAL ORDER
No 24.

All military officers or agents having in their possession money or property belonging to the State, particularly quartermaster stores, clothing, camp and garrison equipage, commissary and ordnance stores, are required to make a full and complete return of it to the Adjutant-General, according to the forms required by the Regulations, showing the amount received, issued and remaining on hand at the end of the present and each subsequent quarter.

General order No. 17 not having been complied with, all officers failing to comply with this order will be reported to the Governor to be dismissed from the service as the following extracts of the law direct.

[Extract from the "Bill" approved September 20th 1861.]

"Sec 78. All military officers having the charge of money or property belonging to the State shall make a quarterly return of the same to the Adjutant-General, in such form as he may prescribe, and also any other returns or reports which he may require. * * All said returns shall be made within twenty days after the expiration of the quarter, and any officer failing to make the same in one month after the expiration of such quarter, or to settle up his accounts when required to do so, and pay any balance due by him on account for any property for which he ought to account, shall be dismissed by the Governor, unless sufficient excuse is rendered for such failure or default."

"Sec 80. All former disbursing officers who shall not have closed their accounts and had the same settled prior to the 2th of August, 1861, shall make the settlement of the same with the Adjutant General; * * and all officers having public property of every kind and description which shall be in his hands, who shall go out of office on the 20th of August, or before or after that time, shall account for and deliver such property to the Adjutant-General, and failing to do so shall be liable to be sued in the name of the State; and all suits at law which it may be necessary to prosecute under this act for the State, may be brought in the Superior Court of Wake county."
