WOODSIDE PRAIRIE.

A very enjoyable entertainment was given at Mr. Batchart's residence Thursday night, where we saw many of the boys who have been absent during the summer; all extend thanks to Mr. B. and family.

Bill Harekom tells us that his wheat yielded twenty-three and a half bushels per acre, and he has sold several loads at Wadena, all of which grade No. 1.

Dell Gronber and family are now stopping at James Harekom's. The appearance of a lady in a house is one of the best of improvements (for Jim).

E. Goodale had 281 bushels of wheat (threshers measure) from twelve acres.

Mr. Dobson's wheat yielded 22 bushels per acre.

The average yield of wheat on this prairie is 20 bushels per acre. Some that was sown on spring plowing produced only 12 bushels per acre.

Some others were sown late, one piece in particular, about the first of June, and yet this gave fair returns for the poor way in which it was cultivated.

And this reminds us of the fact that many of our farmers are young men, that prior to immigrating to this country were merchants, or followed some other vocation than farming, and therefore, must learn at the expensive school of experience, or from some other source, and many of them have looked anxiously to the columns of the N. P.
