Bemidji people should get their smoked glasses ready for the eclipse of the sun which is advertised to appear May 28th. The eclipse will be total in some parts of the United States, but here it will only be partial and of little scientific interest. About three-fourths of the sun's diameter and about two-thirds of the sun's surface will be covered by the moon's disk. It will begin here about seven o'clock in the morning and end a little after nine. It will not cause much of a diminution of daylight, and will probably not be noticed at all by many people who may not be reminded of it. Lots of our people will not get up in time to see the show. The first contact will be on the right hand, or west edge of the sun, above the middle, and the last contact on the left-hand edge.
