## The Symptoms of Smallpox

Now that smallpox threatens to invade every corner of this section this winter and already has perhaps a hundred victims in Beltrami county, it is well for everyone to be on the lookout to entertain it. As the disease in many cases is so mild that it requires the assistance of competent doctors to locate it, it is well to study up on the symptoms.

Dr. H. M. Bracken, secretary of the state board of health, says the form of smallpox at present prevalent is what is known in the profession as varioloid, a mild form of the disease. This differs from chickenpox, in that a virulent form of smallpox could be contracted from the varioloid, that is to say, that a patient suffering from the mild form which is fatal to the extent of about one in seventy, can transfer the more virulent and deadly type of disease.

Asked as to the first symptoms of smallpox, Dr. Bracken stated that three or four days before the eruption appears the patient feels quite sick and has more or less pain in the head and limbs, particularly in the back and loins; the temperature rises considerable, sometimes as high as 104 degrees, and sometimes not so much. This is accompanied by a general feeling of discomfort.

The early symptoms, the doctor says, are sometimes mistaken for typhoid fever during the warmer seasons of the year and for grip during the cold season.

At the end of three or four days from the first symptoms the eruption appears, which is apt to be on the exposed part of the body—at first on the entire body.

The first appearance of the eruption is that of little red spots that are hard to the touch and might be described as having a shotty feeling, that is as though there were shots under the skin.

Following the eruption the red spots change into blisters or vesicles filled with fluid, and within a few days the fluid becomes white and later dries up, leaving scabs.

## Smallpox In Lumber Camps

Dr. H. M. Bracken of the state board of health is now receiving reports from the medical inspectors appointed by the board to keep account of the smallpox in the lumber camps.

One inspector reports smallpox in a lumber camp at Finlayson, Pine county. At Nary, in the northern portion of Hubbard county, two patients are ill in a camp containing fourteen men, besides women and children, all of whom have been exposed to the disease.

"At this camp there developed a conflict between the town board of health and the camp officials as to what the disease was, and an inspector was sent from Bemidji. "The state board," said Dr. Bracken, "yesterday received a telegram from one of the camps in the north, asking for an inspector to vaccinate one hundred men.

"That is one of the companies which is trying to carry out our instructions," said Dr. Bracken. "But many will not even take ordinary precautions. Lumbermen who say that there is no smallpox in the camps are mistaken.

"The same may be said of those lumbermen who say that the cases of smallpox are not smallpox, but only varioloid. Varioloid is merely a light attack of smallpox taken by a person partially protected from the disease. A person may catch smallpox from varioloid as easily as from smallpox.

"The state board wants the lumbermen to vaccinate their men, but some lumbermen protest that it is impracticable. The board wants them to maintain small isolated detention camps and to disinfect their camps where smallpox existed last year."—St. Paul Pioneer Press.

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
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
