COMMERCIAL CLUB

Held Meeting in City Hall Tuesday Night. Officers Elected.

A Board of Directors, Representing Each Business in City Appointed.

Meetings to Be Held the First Monday of Each Month.

A meeting of the Commercial club was held in the city hall last Tuesday evening. After some discussion the permanent organization of the club was effected.

Following are the officers elected for the ensuing year: President, J. M. Markham; vice-president, W. L. Brooks; second vice-president, A. P. White; secretary, P. J. Russell; treasurer, H. W. Bailey.

A committee of five was appointed by the president to choose seventeen representatives from the different professions and callings in the city, these seventeen to constitute a board of directors.

Regular and special meetings of the club will be held in the city hall until rooms are arranged for. There is some talk of papering and furnishing a couple of rooms in the city hall for this purpose.

The purpose of this club will be to get the business men of this city to concentrate their efforts in the establishing of new manufacturing industries, promote the general welfare of the city and advertise our many natural advantages to homeseekers.

On Wednesday afternoon the board of directors met in L. H. Bailey's office and permanently organized. President Markham and Vice-President Brooks are executive officers of the board. C. R. Martin was chosen permanent secretary of directorate.

A committee consisting of W. F. Street, J. M. Markham, L. H. Bailey, P. J. Russell, Chester McKusick, A. P. White, W. L. Brooks and Fred Brinkman was appointed to transact special business. Chairmen of the several sub-committees were appointed, who shall select from two to four assistants from the membership. Another meeting of the directors will be held next Saturday, when the full committees will be announced.

BEMIDJI TOO LATE

No One Made Protest Until The New Division Was Done.

Washington, March 31.—The officials of the land office are very much surprised at the strenuous objections that have been made to the plan of reorganizing the Minnesota land districts, recently decided upon. The question was thoroughly canvassed with members of the Minnesota delegation and not until formal announcement of the order of Commissioner Richards was any criticism of the proposed rearrangement heard from.

The action of Representative Steenerson in protesting against the location of the new office at Cass Lake, is particularly surprising to the officials. Steenerson was one of the members who participated in a conference at the land office here, and at that time made no objection to the new office going to Cass Lake. He made no suggestion whatever concerning Bemidji, until he returned to the state.

ter has been stirred up in the state, growing from the number of letters and telegrams received at the department concerning it. The dissatisfaction with the new districts, as recently outlined in these dispatches, appears to be quite general. The protests from Duluth relative to the territory from that district are very strong. Tams Bixby has been brought into the affair. A telegram was received from him stating that all his early possessions were in and near the vicinity of Bemidji, and he strongly urged that the new office be located in that city. It has been represented to the officials that Senator Nelson opposed the location of the new office at Cass Lake, but Commissioner Rich-

ards asserts that the senator expressed no preference as to location. It is not believed here that any modifications will be made in the order issued by the land commissioner. Telegrams were sent to the land officials in the state today directing them to advise the department how soon they could complete the business in their respective offices, affecting lands in territory which is about to be detached, as soon as this information is received a date will be set, when the proclamation of President Roosevelt announcing the arrangement of the land districts, shall be effective.

It is stated at the department that the new arrangement will necessitate the reappointment of

all the land officials in the state. With one exception it is believed the present personnel will be retained. It is understood that one of the officials at Marshall will retire on account of the removal of the office from that city.
