MESSENGER BOYS OUT.

They Strike and Western Union Threatens to Cut Butte Off Circuit.

Butte, Mont., April 24.—The strike of the messenger boys here has assumed such serious proportions that Western Union Telephone company has threatened to cut Butte off the circuit unless they are furnished protection for the girls and men they have hired to take the strikers place.

Crowds gathered around the company's office, and the appearance of a non-union man was the signal for a shower of eggs and decayed vegetable, and some instances bricks and stones were thrown. The police seemed in sympathy with the strike and made little effort to disperse the crowd.

One man who attempted to deliver a message was set upon by the mob and stuck head first in a barrel of decayed vegetables. He was rescued by the police in an unconscious condition.

Fire Laddies at Work.

The fire department was called out recently, not to put out a fire but to vary the monotony. Shovels and picks were distributed among the boys and an hour was spent in smoothing down Summit avenue between First and Main streets, preparatory to the first practice for the firemen's tournament which is to be held at Park Rapids.
