### ALMOST A RIOT

#### Several Lumberjacks at Camp Near Mallard Break Quarantine.

#### Dr. Blakeslee Called to That Place Yesterday to Quiet the Situation.

The men in headquarters camp near Mallard, who have been in quarantine for the past ten days, broke quarantine yesterday and proceeded to celebrate the event by loading up on squirrel whisky. They took handcars and rode to Mallard, defying the authorities of that place, and proceeded to run the town. Dr. Blakeslee, accompanied by Dr. Brown of Farley, left for the scene of trouble last night and succeeded in getting the men together, and gave them their choice of going back to camp until the quarantine was raised or taking the consequences. After some deliberation among themselves they agreed to go back to camp, and when the doctors left at midnight the men had all gone back to the camp and announced their intention of staying until the doctor gave them permission. The logging train has been given permission to carry passengers as far as Alida.

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
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
