IT LOOKS LIKE ROSEAU

Great Northern Surveyors Moving North Toward Roseau.

The Great Northern surveyors, who have been working on the north end of the Pelican Rapids extension, have completed their work south of Melntosh and moved north. Just what or where they are headed for is a secret which is being carefully guarded, but looks like Roseau, with a possible extension to Warroad. Their course so far as outlined is a trifle east of north and takes them about three miles east of Lambert and sixteen to twenty miles east of Thief River Falls. Following this course, and assuming that Roseau is their destination, they would run into that village by way of the oil trail, a little to the west of the south fork of the Roseau river. This would give them an excellent location and the cream of the territory of their present lines.

FOSSON TO CELEBRATE

The People of That Burg Will Honor Norwegian Independence Day.

The 17th of May, the anniversary of the drafting of the constitution of Norway, and recognized as Norwegian Independence day, will be appropriately observed by the Norsk residents of Fosston, by a patriotic celebration at Ouff lake, about two miles west of the city. 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
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
