A PREMONITION.

Ronk Denied New Trial.

Blue Earth, Minn., Aug. 27.—The hearing on the motion for a new trial in the case of Bert Ronk came up before Judge Quinn yesterday. After hearing argument the judge denied the motion. Ronk will probably be taken to Stillwater today to begin serving a twenty-year sentence for the killing of Charles G. Eberlin on Walnut lake on March 20.

The warehouse of P. W. Eng & Sons, whisky distillers of New York, was gutted by fire, causing a loss estimated at \$175,000.

The Fort Smith & Western railway has filed with the territorial secretary at Guthrie, Okla., a first mortgage for \$5,000,000 in favor of the Mercantile Trust Company of New York.

Right Rev. Father C. A. Lysaght, dean of the Northwest district of the Catholic diocese of Nebraska, died at Jackson, Neb., from a complication of diseases. He was fifty-three years of age and had been connected officially with the work of the Catholic church in Nebraska for twenty years.

IN AN UNMARKED GRAVE.

Body of a Revolutionary Soldier Is Found in Iowa.

Washington, Iowa, Aug. 27.—The remains of Timothy Brown, Revolutionary soldier, were disinterred yesterday. He was found in an unmarked grave in a neglected cemetery. The remains have been placed in a vault until arrangements can be made for suitable exercises at the burial. Only five Revolutionary soldiers are buried in Iowa.

TAKE THE WHOLE ISSUE.

New York Firm Buys \$3,000,000 Philippine Certificates.

Washington, Aug. 27.—Bids were opened at the bureau of insular affairs, war department, for the purchase of \$3,000,000 certificates of indebtedness for the Philippine government. Harvey Fisk & Sons, New York, bid for all or any part of the amount at \$1.0224. This was the only bid for the whole amount and it was accepted.

BLOW TO IRELAND.

Archbishop Is Not Favored by New Pope's Advisers.

Rome, Aug. 27.—When it became known the pope favored the creation of a new American cardinal many strong objections were addressed to him against Archbishop Ireland, both from Italy and America. Archbishop Ryan of Philadelphia has been warily welcomed for the honor, and he now seems the favorite at the Vatican.

Toadstools for Mushrooms.

La Crosse, Wis., Aug. 27.—As a result of eating mushrooms picked in their yard the entire family of six of B. L. Schuler of this city, and a guest, Mrs. A. Clark of Chicago, are seriously ill. It is thought toadstools were mixed with the mushrooms. Mrs. Clark is very low.

Engineer and Fireman Killed.

Ashtrubala, Ohio, Aug. 27.—A crown head on a Lake Shore freight engine burst yesterday, killing the engineer and fireman.

TAFT WILL SUCCEED ROOT.

Gen. Luke E. Wright Will Become Governor of the Philippines.

Oyster Bay, L. I., Aug. 27.—Secretary Root, under date of Aug. 19, presented his resignation formally to the president. The resignation was accepted by the president with the understanding that Mr. Root should continue as secretary of war at least until Jan. 1. Gov. Gen. William H. Taft of the Philippines will succeed Secretary Root. President Roosevelt yesterday authorized the following statement:

"The president some months ago tendered the secretaryship of war to Judge Taft and at that time it was arranged that he would succeed Secretary Root. Secretary Root will go out of office some time in January, and Judge Taft will assume the duties of office shortly afterward."

Gen. Luke E. Wright of Memphis, Tenn., will succeed Judge Taft as governor of the Philippines. President Roosevelt authorized the Associated Press to make the announcement that the post had been offered to Gen. Wright and that he had accepted it. Gen. Wright is now a member of the Philippine commission and vice governor of the islands. He is a life-long Democrat.

PISTOL DUEL AT NORTHFIELD.

Chief of Police Shoots Hans Hanson in the Leg.

Northfield, Minn., Aug. 27.—Chief of Police Ramage had an encounter with Hans Hanson, who has been working near Farmington. Hanson was intoxicated and the chief ordered him to leave town. This he would not do, and when the chief undertook to take him to the lock-up he opened fire with a revolver. Ramage then fired two shots, one of which inflicted a flesh wound in Hanson's leg.

FATAL RESCUE WORK.

Foreman Asphyxiated After Tying a Rope About Body of Miner.

Deadwood, S. D., Aug. 27.—Fire has destroyed the small shafthouse at the Lucky Strike mine south of this city. After the debris had been cleared away it was found that part of the machinery had fallen down the shaft. Harry Metzger, one of the employees of the company volunteered to go into

the mine and bring the machinery up. He went down the ladder and when at the bottom became unconscious, and Fred W. Floormann, the foreman at the mine, immediately went down into the shaft to rescue him. Floormann tied a rope around Metzger's body and the men above brought the young man to the surface. Floormann then started to climb up the ladder, and when partly up was overcome by gas and fell backward to the bottom of the shaft. When he was brought to the surface it was found he had been asphyxiated. The company sustained a loss of about \$600.

INVENTS A NEW FUEL.

Tow Mill Refuse Mixed With Coal Oil and Pressed.

Heron Lake, Minn., Aug. 27.—A new fuel has been invented. J. T. Smith, the patentee, has for several months been experimenting with the mixture of crude oil and the refuse from his tow mill, the result being a very good and inexpensive fuel. The mixture of oil and refuse is run through a specially devised press, and comes out in bales of any desired size, and is tightly pressed. A trial of it the other day proved beyond doubt that it is a good substitute for either coal or wood, especially for threshing machines or stationary engines. Mr. Smith intends to start several plants throughout the country.

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
