NEWS IN BRIEF.

Overflow From the Wires in a Condensed Form.
 The explosion of an oil tank set fire to a number of cars standing on the side tracks at Greensboro, N. C., and about twenty-five cars were entirely destroyed.

According to a statement issued by the state commissioner of agriculture the cotton crop of this season for Georgia is 1,070,000 bales against 1,470,000 last year.

Deadly gases in the bottom of a thirty-foot well at the Day Chemical works at Westline, Pa., caused two deaths and several other men had narrow escapes from sharing the same fate.

FOUND A TREASURE SHIP.

Vessel Loaded With Silver Supposed to Have Sunk in 1835.
 Jacksonville, Fla., Sept. 26.—Rumors of the finding of a treasure ship off Miami were confirmed yesterday when Capt. Jennings and three of the crew of the wrecking schooner Osseo filed a libel against the cargo of a sunken ship in the United States court here. With the assistance of a chart in his possession Capt. Jennings has been searching for this vessel from time to time for many years. It is supposed to have gone ashore in 1835 loaded with ore from the Mexican mines. It was found in five feet of water near Miami. Its cargo, which has only been partly examined, has been found to consist of silver ore.

WILL NOT RUST.

Gen. Miles Says He Prefers to Wear Out, and Enters Business.
 Chicago, Sept. 26.—Gen. Nelson A. Miles, recently retired as commander-in-chief of the United States army, left last night for Beaumont, Tex., where he has invested in an oil company. He is associated with Ex-Gov. Hogg of Texas in the venture. He takes the trip to secure an option on several large producing wells. "I won't rust out, I will wear out," he told friends, in announcing his venture.

Leat Child to Death.

Newcastle, Ind., Sept. 26.—The county authorities are investigating what is believed to be a case of murder. The victim is the two-year-old child of Samuel Criner. Neighbors claim its death was directly due to a severe beating given it by its father.

Six Persons Injured.

Nashville, Ind., Sept. 26.—Six persons were injured, two fatally, by the explosion of a boiler at James Wise's sawmill yesterday afternoon. Several adjacent buildings were damaged.

FIERCE RUSH AT THE "U."

Medical Students in a Rough-and-Tumble Fight.
 Minneapolis, Sept. 26.—One of the fiercest cane rushes ever seen on the University of Minnesota campus was pulled off yesterday afternoon, when the freshmen and sophomore classes of the medical department clashed. The principal event was a free-for-all fight which raged up and down the campus for half an hour, and the freshmen were conceded to have the best of it. Hats were battered, clothing was torn and men were rolled about in the grass. Others piled on them until there would be twenty in a struggling, kicking, pulling, hitting and roaring heap. In the ring events, boxing and wrestling, the middle classmen had all the best of it, however. A husky young embryo physician defeated one man in three rounds and put out an unknown freshie in about thirty seconds. The "unknown" was knocked out completely and it took some time to bring him around. The "soph" won everything save one wrestling match. There has been feeling between the classes for some time but it did not break out until late yesterday afternoon, and the result was a battle royal.

BURGLARS ROB BANK.

Mined Safe Is Not Examined for Fear It Contains Charge of Nitroglycerine.
 Roberts, Wis., Sept. 26.—Robbers, supposed to be from St. Paul, early yesterday morning broke into and robbed the bank at this place. They blew up a large safe with nitroglycerine. There was \$35 in 1903 nickels in the outer part of the safe, which they secured. In the inner safe was \$3,000 in bills which the bank received the previous night. Whether this was obtained by the robbers or not was determined for a considerable time. The inner safe had been left closed by the robbers, but nitroglycerine about indicated that there might be a charge inside, and the citizens feared to pry open the door of the inner safe. The outer door was badly wrecked by three explosions. Traces about the building indicated that there were two or three men engaged on the job. They probably escaped on a hand car as the local section house was broken into and the car found three miles east of Hudson. Machinery to remove the explosives has been sent for and the safe will be opened to-day.

ILLINOIS WINS RIFLE SHOOT.

Minnesota Is Second and Iowa Gets Third Place.
 Lake City, Minn., Sept. 26.—Illinois won the interstate rifle competition held at Camp Lakeview and retains the Washburn trophy which has been in the possession of that state since 1891. Minnesota, the challenger in the competition, secures second place with a narrow margin of fourteen over Iowa, which gets third and last place. The feature of yesterday's shooting was the fine skirmish work of Illinois. The men from that state went into the contest yesterday morning ten points behind Minnesota, which led the other states in the fixed target firing. By noon Illinois had gained a lead of 338 points over Minnesota and 254 points over Iowa, which led Minnesota by 84 points. The boys from this state, however, found the target more frequently in the afternoon runs, and the score they made, coupled with their lead in the fixed range shooting, gave them the necessary total to win second place.

WISCONSIN TRAGEDY.

Oconomowoc Man Commits Suicide After Shooting Brother-in-Law.
 Oconomowoc, Wis., Sept. 26.—Geo. Daily attempted to shoot his wife, shot his brother-in-law, set fire to his house and barn and finally committed suicide by blowing his head off in his burning house. Mrs. Daily, with her four children, left her husband yesterday morning and went to live with her mother. Mrs. Lucy Kellogg. Last evening Daily came to the house of his mother-in-law and shot at his wife through the window. His brother-in-law, Cliff Kellogg, then went to the door. Daily shot him in the foot and then drove with great rapidity to his home, about half a mile away, where he set fire to the house and barn. The firemen were ordered away by Daily on pain of being shot. He kept them at bay for about an hour, while the barn burned to the ground and the house was nearly consumed. Then he shot himself with a shotgun, dying instantly.

ACCUSED OF FORGERY.

Check Found on Prisoner Signed by St. Paul Man.
 Mitchell, S. D., Sept. 26.—George Martin was arrested here by Chief Martin of Sioux Falls and Detective McNamara of the Omaha railroad. Chief Martin had a picture and description of the man and of points where he was wanted. When searched Martin had on his person a check for \$810 payable to John D. Moran and signed by a St. Paul man. Martin is wanted at Joliet and Peoria, Ill., on charges of forgery.

Frost Not an Unmixed Evil.

Webster City, Iowa, Sept. 26.—The hardest frost of the season struck Hamilton county last night, but is estimated to have done but little damage as the corn needed something to stop the rank growth.

Red River Valley Expo.

Grand Forks, N. D., Sept. 26.—Yesterday was the opening day of the Red River Valley exposition here. The weather was bad. About 3,000 people attended. The races were close and interesting.
