GUNBOAT IS SENT WAR CLOUDS LIFT

AMERICAN INTERESTS ON ST. ANDREWS ISLAND WILL BE PROTECTED.

NASHVILLE ORDERED TO SCENE

BELIEVED BOGOTA GOVERNMENT WILL UNDERSTAND HER MISSION.

TROUBLE WITH CABLE COMPANY

MINISTER BEAUPRE REPORTS THAT SERIOUS TROUBLE IS LIKELY.

Washington, Sept. 30.—Edward W. Trimmer, American consul at Bluefields, was at the state department yesterday to confer with the authorities about the reported troubles at St. Andrews island, off the Nicaragua coast.

The trouble developed after Mr. Trimmer left for his vacation, and it was reported to the state department by the agent acting in his absence. It is expected the gunboat Nashville, which has been ordered to St. Andrews, will get under way from Pensacola to-day. Bluefields will probably be one of her ports of call.

Acting Secretary of State Adee yesterday said that there had been no pour parlers between the state department and the Colombian government regarding the St. Andrews trouble, and it is believed the Bogota government will appreciate the fact that the mission of the Nashville is in the interest of restoring order and affording protection to American citizens.

Cable Row On.

The state department is taking great interest in the fight now going on between Colombia and the cable company which lands at Panama. Advice received from Minister Beaupre yesterday afternoon indicate that serious troubles may be expected unless the cable company shall defer its intended action of refusing to transmit messages from Buena Ventura to Panama. Acting under instructions from the state department, Beaupre is endeavoring to arrange some amicable adjustment of the difficulty.

It was officially explained at the state department yesterday that the trouble in Colombia arises from the refusal of the Colombian government to extend the concession to the cable company, and to give the company more favorable terms. Under the present concession, which expires in 1904, the cable company operates a line from Panama to Buena Ventura. From Buena Ventura a land line belonging to the Colombian government extends to Bogota. The cable company has announced that unless the new concession is granted as asked for it will refuse to transmit any government messages from Buena Ventura to Panama after Oct. 1.

STILL TALKING CANAL.

Colombian Congress Devoting Its Attention to the Treaty.

Colon, Sept. 30.—Advice have been received from Bogota that congress has passed a law authorizing the president to conclude a canal treaty with the United States without the approval of congress.

Washington, Sept. 30.—The following bulletin was posted at the state department yesterday:

"The state department received today at 1:12 p. m. a cable message from Minister Beaupre, dated Sept. 27, 8 p. m. He reports that there has been no change in the situation in respect to the canal matter. A second debate on the bill reported by the committee is expected within a few days, and it is thought that it will be defeated. The present outlook is for some amendment of the reported bill."

THREE BUILDINGS WRECKED.

Explosion Occurs at the Cornell Powder Mills Near Shamokin, Pa.

Shamokin, Pa., Sept. 30.—An explosion occurred at the Cornell powder mills near here yesterday and the dye house and two storehouses were wrecked. Fire followed the explosion and three other buildings of the plant were destroyed. No one was injured. The loss is between \$35,000 and \$40,000.

CAR RUNS AWAY.

Ten Persons Are Injured, Two Seriously, in Chicago.

Chicago, Sept. 30.—Ten persons were injured, two seriously, in an accident on the Halstead street cable line. The train ran away and for two blocks imperiled the lives of many persons. It is said the train was in charge of a new gripman. Two wagons were struck before it came to a stop.

Thousands of Acres of Corn Ruined.

Clinton, Iowa, Sept. 30.—The Mississippi river, which registers 15 1/2 feet above low water mark, yesterday spread over the low lands near here, inundating thousands of acres of corn, ruining hay and submerging pastures.

Farmer Loses His Grain.

Spring Valley, Wis., Sept. 30.—Allan Green at Olive lost all his grain last night by a fire which burned the stacks and the separator belonging to F. B. Churchill; no insurance. It is thought the fire was incendiary.

THE MACEDONIAN SITUATION NOW APPEARS MUCH BRIGHTER.

TURKISH TROOPS WILL NOT MOVE

FORTE'S ASSURANCE LESSENS APPREHENSION IN BULGARIA.

KILL ALL BULGARIAN CAPTIVES

LONDON TIMES LEARNS THAT SULTAN HAS ISSUED SUCH ORDERS.

Sofia, Bulgaria, Sept. 30.—The situation here is much brighter and the war clouds appear to have lifted. The port's assurance that the thirty-two battalions recently ordered to proceed from Monastir to Adrianople will not be moved has lessened the apprehension of the Bulgarian government. Further satisfaction is derived from the fact that M. Natchovitch is going to Constantinople in the capacity of Bulgarian diplomatic agent. He conducted the negotiations with the port's last June, and after their failure returned to Sofia.

Ministry Doing Its Best.

The committee appointed for the purpose at the time of Sunday's demonstration of 15,000 Macedonians in this city yesterday waited on Premier Petroff and asked him if the government intended to do anything to help the Macedonians. M. Petroff replied that the ministry was acting in what it conceived to be the best interests of Bulgaria, and would continue the same policy.

The Dnevnik, commenting on the situation, says: "Although the Bulgarians remain quiet, it is not a true indication of the national feelings, but it is owing to the approaching elections." The paper adds that it will "not be long before everybody will try to force the government into action."

To Kill All Bulgarian Captives.

London, Sept. 30.—The Times learns from a trustworthy source that the Palace committee at Yildiz Kiosk has recommended that all Bulgarians captured in the future shall be shot. It is stated that the sultan holds the same view and that the necessary orders have been issued.

Gory, Turk Honored.

Salonica, Sept. 30.—Bakharz Pasha, who was responsible for the massacres at Krushevo and Smilevo, has been decorated with the Order of the Medjidie of the first class. He has been sent to the district of Kastoria, where six villages already have been burned and many insurgents killed.

BECKER OUT OF PRISON.

Notorious Forger Released From San Quentin.

San Francisco, Sept. 30.—Charles Becker, the most accomplished forger in the country, if not in the world, was released yesterday from San Quentin prison after serving a seven-year sentence. His crime was the raising of a \$12 check on the Crocker-Woolworth bank to \$22,000. The check was beautifully executed and it was readily cashed at the Nevada bank by one of Becker's pals. Yesterday Becker said he was going straight back to New York. His wife lives in Brooklyn and he expects to find her there. It has been rumored that the American Bankers' association has given him a good salary to abstain from forgery, but this Becker denies.

POPE MAY LEAVE VATICAN.

Gives Impression That He Will Not Remain a Prisoner.

Rome, Sept. 30.—According to the Tribuna Pius X., on receiving the abbot of the celebrated monastery of Monte Cassini, in the Campania, said: "We shall soon meet, most reverend father, at Monte Cassini." Then remarking the effect that his words produced an impression that his holiness would some day leave the Vatican precincts, he added: "Pray, for all things are obtained by prayer." The pope is also said to have told the abbot of the Benedictine monastery at Cava Dei Tirriene, near Salerno, that he himself would open the jubilee of the immaculate conception.

TOO MUCH IRON ORE.

Ishpeming Company Will Lay Off the Night Shift.

Marquette, Mich., Sept. 30.—The Cleveland Cliffs company, the largest independent producer of iron ore in the Ishpeming fields, yesterday instructed the management to lay off the night shifts at all four of the company's mines in the Ishpeming region. Some 600 men will be affected. Overproduction of ore is assigned as the reason for the curtailment.

ROW ENDS IN MURDER.

Wisconsin Man Fatally Shot After a Slight Altercation.

Ashland, Wis., Sept. 30.—William Voight of Mercer was shot yesterday afternoon by Sam Duesette and he died three hours after being brought to Ashland. The two men had a slight altercation, whereupon Duesette went to a neighboring store and borrowed a rifle, saying he was going duck shooting. Returning to where he had left Voight, he fired at him shooting him through the body.
