BURNS DREW THE LIMIT

Judge Galchutt Gave Him Ninety Days Straight Off the Bat.

CHARGE CHANGED TO READ SIMPLE ASSAULT.

Burns Takes an Appeal and District Court Will Settle Matter.

The case of Joseph Burns, who entered the school house at Nymore last Thursday afternoon and administered a whipping to a small boy named Axel Kling, was up for trial before Judge Galchutt at Nymore last Saturday. Attorney Loud appeared for the state and Burns was defended by Attorney Scratchin of this city.

The original charge of assault and battery in the second degree was dismissed by County Attorney Loud and Burns pleaded not guilty to a charge of simple assault. Three witnesses testified before the state rested, one of them being the teacher of the grammar department of the Nymore schools, Miss Chesborough. The evidence was very conclusive and the defense interposed nothing in the way of evidence. Judge Galchutt pronounced Burns guilty of the offense as charged and gave him ninety days straight in the county jail, without the option of a fine. Attorney Scratchin served notice of an appeal, which was perfected afterwards and Burns released under bonds.

Nymore people are well satisfied with Judge Galchutt's disposal. The sentence was the maximum possible to impose under the charge. Burns' appeal disposes of the matter until the next term of the district court, when his attorney hopes to secure for him a more satisfactory settlement.
