FIVE NEW ONES

New Ordinances Soon to Be
Effective in Village of
Nymore.

Five new city ordinances are
soon to be effective in the thriving
village of Nymore and the official
publication is at present being
made in the official paper of the
village, the Beltrami County
News.

Ordinance No. 4 relates to the
construction and maintenance of
streets, alleys, sidewalks and the
keeping of public grounds. Ordi-
nance No. 5 relates to public
nuisances, establishes classifica-
tion and provides penalties. Ordi-
nance No. 6 makes it unlawful to
conduct a disorderly house in the
village of Nymore and ordinance
No. 7 regulates the sale of intoxi-
cating liquors, fixing penalties
for violation. No. 9 pertains to
assaults, breaches of the public
peace, vagrants and disorderly
conduct. All have been adopted
by the village council and will be
effective after their publication
in three issues of the News is
completed.
