JOHN MITCHELL'S VIEWS.

Upholds the Boycott and Opposes the Closed Shop.

New York, Nov. 25.—John Mitchell, president of the United Mine Workers of America, at a dinner of the Universalist club, declared, when asked if he considered the boycott fair: "The boycott may be cruel and inhuman, or it may be helpful and of great good. I believe that a thousand men have a right to do what one man has a right to do."

"I am opposed to closed shops on the ground that a man has a right to work for whom he pleases, but not a right to work under whatever condition he pleases."

Mr. Mitchell also declared against the incorporation of unions. He predicted that the present era of industrial war would be succeeded by an era of peace, "with honor to both sides."

ESCAPES UNINJURED.

Insane Man Fires Four Shots at Bank of England Official.

London, Nov. 25.—A murderous attack with a revolver was made during the day on Kenneth Grahame, secretary of the Bank of England, by an individual who is supposed to be insane. He fired four shots in rapid succession, but Mr. Grahame was not hurt. Considerable difficulty was experienced in securing the would-be assassin. A fire hose had to be requisitioned before he could be disarmed and taken to the police station.

TWO HUNDRED DROWNED.

Great Damage Done by Flood in Palar River in India.

London, Nov. 25.—A telegram has been received at the Indian office from the viceroy of India, Lord Curzon, saying that, according to reports received at Madras, a flood in the Palar river on Nov. 12 destroyed half of the town of Vanisambadi, in the Salem district. Two hundred persons were drowned. The floods, the telegram says, have now subsided.

JAPANESE ARE IMPATIENT.

No Reply From St. Petersburg to Overtures Made.

Yokohama, Nov. 25.—No reply has been received from St. Petersburg on the subject of the Japanese overtures and there are many indications that the delay in the negotiations is embarrassing Japanese foreign trade and raising impatience in Japanese popular circles, as shown by public meetings at Tokio, Yokohama and Osaka protesting against the ministerial inactivity.

Washington, Nov. 25.—Dispatches from Tokio received at the Japanese legation here make no mention of Japanese warships being dispatched to prevent Russian war vessels reaching Port Arthur. On the contrary the advices are to the effect that there is a favorable outlook regarding a settlement of the questions at issue between Japan and Russia.

Nothing is known here of the reported occupation of Wiju by Japan and the officials say they would be surprised to have the report confirmed in view of the fact that this is the port which United States Minister Miller has gone to Chemulpo to endeavor to have opened to the world's trade.

If the report is true officials say there can be but one conclusion drawn from the fact, namely, that the move is a war measure on Japan's part and is made in full consideration of the fact that it is no longer possible to avoid a hostile clash with Russia.

Killed by Falling Tree.

Menomonie, Wis., Nov. 25.—Hans Vigerust, a resident of this city, was killed by a tree falling on him. He was employed at Robert Pollock's lumber camp, in the town of Weston, at the time of his death.
