## LOGS A TOWNSITE

H. J. McCarty to Log Three Forties Adjoining Townsite This Winter.

Northome Record: H. J. McCarty, the well known logger, has opened a camp in camps occupied last winter by Joseph Farley. McCarty will haul the logs that were cut last summer on the townsite into the lake and will log the three forties south, southeast and west adjoining the townsite, beside some more further south. A crew of men has been at work this week cutting roads under Foreman Haden and it is expected that hauling will be commenced today. Some thirty men will be employed.
