Ordinance No. 16
An Ordinance to prevent the unlawful use of, or the interfering or tampering with the property of the Virginia Light and Water Company.
The Village Council of the Village of Virginia do ordain as follows:
Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to take any water from or across any of the fastenings of or in any manner tamper with or interfere with or use any of the public fire hydrants established by the Virginia Light and Water Company in the Village of Virginia for the use of the Village, unless such person so interfering or using such hydrant or hydrants is a member of the fire department or an employee of the said village and is engaged in sprinkling the streets thereof and acting as such or, as such employee, a permit from the Village authorities or from the Virginia Light and Water Company.
Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to take any electricity from any of the wires or in any manner tamper or interfere with or use any of the lamps or wires established by the Virginia Light and Water Company in said Village for the use of the said Village.
Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to unlawfully use, interfere or tamper with any of the lines or appliances furnished by the Virginia Light and Water Company to its customers, unless such person is an authorized employee of the Company or is one of the customers of the Company operating such appliances under the Rules and Regulations of the said Company.
Section 4. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, before any Court having jurisdiction be fined in a sum not less than One Dollar and not more than One Hundred Dollars with costs of prosecution and in default of payment of such fine and costs, may be committed to the county jail or to the village lock-up until such fine and costs be fully paid, not to exceed Ninety Days.
Section 5. Any person who shall unlawfully or maliciously displace, remove, injure or destroy any fire alarm box or apparatus connected therewith, put up for the use of said Village, or shall send in any false fire alarm from any of said boxes shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof before any Court having jurisdiction shall be punished as provided in Section 4 of this Ordinance.
Section 6. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the passage and publication.

Ordinance No. 16

Section 4. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, before any Court having jurisdiction be fined in a sum not less than One Dollar and not more than One Hundred Dollars with costs of prosecution and in default of payment of such fine and costs, may be committed to the county jail or to the village lock-up until such fine and costs be fully paid, not to exceed Ninety Days.

Section 5. Any person who shall unlawfully or maliciously displace, remove, injure or destroy any fire alarm box or apparatus connected therewith, put up for the use of said Village, or shall send in any false fire alarm from any of said boxes shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof before any Court having jurisdiction shall be punished as provided in Section 4 of this Ordinance.

Section 6. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the passage and publication.
