

Great Medicine Chief—Dr. Miller. This Tribe is constantly increasing its membership, many of the new members coming from Biwabik, Mountain Iron and Eveleth. A grand event is promised by this Tribe on February 22, when they hold their second annual Medicine Dance and Dog Feast at the Fay Opera, to which all Red Men, their squaws and big papposes and all pale faces are invited. The promptors will be Indians—a curiosity to the pale faces.
